Students & Teachers Exchange in CGS – Erasmus +

During the academic years, 2017-2018 and 2018-2019, students and staff of CGS will take part in an exciting new project with schools from the following other European countries. Spain, Italy, Bulgaria, Greece and Turkey.

The project is funded by the European Government and comes under the Erasmus Project, which is organised and promoted by The British Council. We are extremely fortunate and excited to be participating in this project as it could be the last occasion when British schools are able to participate.

Mr. Fyfe, Mrs McGeachy and Ms McAnerney will be attending the 'kick off' meeting in Granada, Spain in November, where they will introduce CGS to the other participating countries using a recently made video.

The key objective of the project is for each participating centre to create a product and promote it for sale within the other participating countries. This will be an Interdisciplinary project with many different departments taking lead roles.



S1 Cyberbullying / Internet Safety

PC Karen Cairns, our Police Youth Engagement Officer, delivered workshops to S1 pupils on 2nd October on how to keep themselves safe online and how to respond to the growing concerns amongst young people everywhere about harassment and bullying online and the dangers to mental health of online use. Topics covered included how to ensure that your settings keep your personal information secure, how to spot accounts that might be a danger, keeping yourself safe from predators, how to report concerns and how to ensure that you are respectful to others online.

Karen will be back in school in November to help S2 pupils to understand and deal with the dangers of knife crime.

Information about Head Lice: Head lice are a common problem in school aged children. They can't be prevented, but regular checking ensures early detection and treatment if necessary. Parents and carers should check their children's head once a week during hair washing. You need your usual shampoo, conditioner, and a detection comb — ask your local pharmacist to recommend a suitable one. Remember that you are looking for moving lice, the only evidence that your child is infected. If you find a living louse, ask your local pharmacist, school nurse, health visitor or GP for advice regarding treatment.



Stewart Ivory Financial Education Trust Presentation

On Tuesday, 2 October, Mr Rene Kleyweg from the Stewart Ivory Financial Education Trust, delivered a Finance workshop called "My Money Talks" to S6 students. This has become an annual part of the S6 Careers Programme, although this is the first time Mr Kleyweg has visited the school. For students who were absent and for parents/carers, the statement below - from the Trust's website - gives an indication of the work the charitable trust carries out.

The Stewart Ivory Financial Education Trust ('SIFET') runs a programme of financial education which is principally aimed at senior pupils in Scotland about to leave schools. The purpose is to prepare them to take control of their own finances in the short term, not only while they are in higher education (universities, colleges etc) or starting work, but to encourage them to think about financial issues for the longer term, including savings, mortgages and pensions.

The work of SIFET is particularly important in raising financial awareness and increasing financial literacy and capability of young people.

Mr Kleyweg also directed students to the GrantFairy app (!) from which grant-related information can be found, as well as direct links on how to apply for these.

Fire Up Scotland 2018




