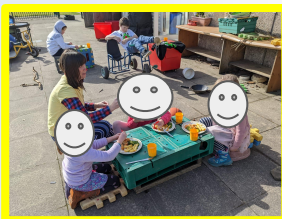

Literacy

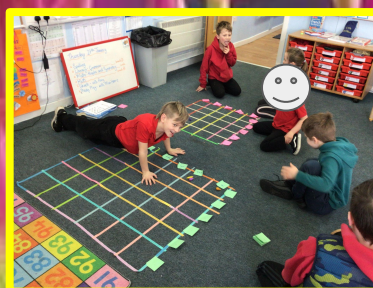
For our literacy work this term we have been focusing on building our skills in reading. We have been learning how to read with expression, read punctuation, summarise information, illustrate a setting, create a character profile, skim and scan and identify genre.

We have also been focusing on using similes, alliteration and rhetorical questions in our writing to create a persuasive piece of work about plastic. During this topic we learned about the positives and negatives of plastic to allow us to develop a well informed, well rounded view. We used literary techniques, as mentioned above, alongside technical language to write a final piece on plastic (please see next page).

In Numeracy this term we have been consolidating our work on addition and subtraction whilst beginning new learning on multiplication and division. We have been using concrete materials to build our understanding in this area and have incorporated lots of active and play based learning. We have also been working on telling time and shape. One of our favourite new games is the big clock game on the pitch- ask us about it to learn more.

For HWB this term we have been learning about Relationships, Sexual Health and Parenthood. As part of this topic we discussed how to keep ourselves and our bodies clean and healthy, consent and the 'pants rule'. We have also been learning about our emotions and how to identify them and manage them. We explored where we feel emotions in our bodies, what they look like and how this may be different for different people- which we linked into our school values of equity and compassion.

Finally, in HWB, for Physical Education we have been focusing on basketball. We are all making developments with dribbling, passing and shooting. We have enjoyed this topic so much that many of us have been practising these skills at playtime and lunchtime.

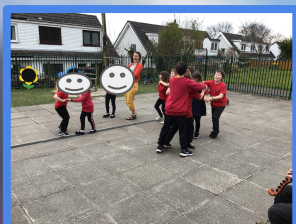
Cormac

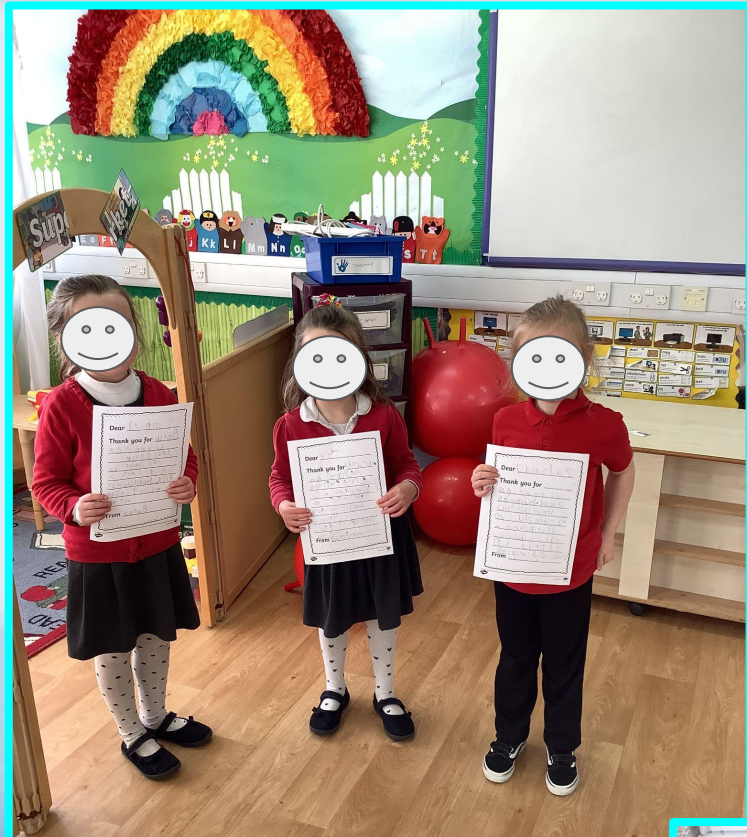

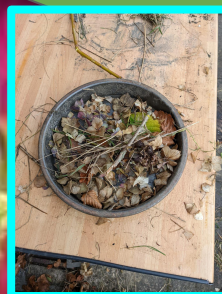

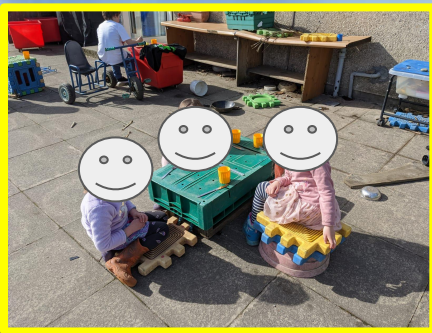
