


The Journey to Excellence Parts 1 and 2 are about bringing


In Scotland, success is about developing the four capacities in Curriculum for Excellence: being successful in learning, being confident, being a good citizen and being able and willing to contribute. Curriculum for Excellence provides a framework for all young people in Scotland to gain the knowledge and skills for learning, skills for life and skills for work that they need to flourish in the fast-changing global society of the 21st century.

The Journey to Excellence provides professional support for teachers in helping all learners to develop these skills and capacities. The ten dimensions of excellence are drivers for improving learning and achieving successful outcomes for individual children and groups of children. These outcomes are the outcomes of Curriculum for Excellence. Curriculum for Excellence, through the experiences and outcomes and Building the Curriculum 3, provides the framework for curriculum planning.

Learning and success for all children need to be planned: they do not happen by chance. Planning ensures that no young people miss out on choices and chances which may affect their future lives. Planning for excellence requires all those involved in supporting young people to consult effectively, share information and take joint action so that we get it right for every child. The Journey to Excellence Part 4 (*Planning for Excellence*) provides an effective tool for undertaking that planning.
