Lab Skills


A group from school visited the MVScotia, Marine Scotland's research vessel at Matthew's Quay, Aberdeen on 17th September along with Mrs Matthew and a student teacher. The visit was an amazing experience for all. The group were shown around the whole ship including the laboratories getting ready for their next trip to sea. Pupils decorated polystyrene cups which were taken to the deepest part of North Sea, where the pressure shrunk them to a fraction of their normal size. Pupils will now visit the Torry lab in December and January to complete practical microbiology aspects of the course.

Quinie Berame and Diana Pituc from S4 attended the SYWBD hands-on workshop at Aberdeen University Medical School on 2nd November. Pupils were given an insight into the life of a Medical student and took part in interactive trauma sessions using state of the art 'Sim Man' technology. They were also given information and advice on preparing for applying and interviewing for Medical degrees.


Support and Improving First Year Mathematics

Prior to the October holiday, all first year pupils sat a number processes assessment in Maths. After the October break, each pupil was issued with a personalised feedback sheet which had their individual marks for each question and also a link to an online post assessment revision tool. The pupils have been shown how to access this resource, but you can also try using the QR code on the picture or by following this link:





Scottish Children's Book Awards 2016


On Tuesday 10th November the Beach Ballroom opened its doors to Northfield Academy pupils, and others from schools around the city, for the Scottish Children's Book Awards 2016. The pupils were treated to a fantastic, intimate session with the three authors nominated for the Older Readers 12-16 category: Elizabeth Wein, Danny Weston and Joan Lingard.

Pupils were educated about the Ethiopian setting of Wein's *Black Dove, White Raven* and were given a whistle-stop tour around the author's explorations of the beautiful country and how it influenced her novel. Next up was Joan Lingard's publicist who spoke on behalf of Joan who was unable to attend the event due to illness. She took the pupils through Joan's writing process and gave them a taste of what to expect from Joan's latest novel *Trouble on Cable Street*. Finally, the pupils were thrilled by an extract of the spooky tale *The Piper*, written by Danny Weston (aka Phillip Caveney) who explained how he writes the perfect horror story and what inspired him to dream up the terrifying tale of the ghostly piper.

Pupils turned the tables and had their chance to ask the authors some questions of their own and pick their brains about the writing process. To the end of the session the pupils were also informed about The Pushkin Prize creative writing competition which is open to first and second years. METAPHROG – BOOK LAUNCH

Patrons of Reading metaphrog gave a talk to more than 250 pupils about the launch of their new Graphic Novel *Red Shoes and other Tales*. Metaphrog's much anticipated new book, which includes modern day interpretations of two of Hans Christian Anderson's classic tales was published in the UK in November 2015. The talented duo gave an enthralling talk to pupils in P6 - S2 from Northfield Academy, St Machar Academy, Torry Academy, Holy Family RC School, Manor Park School, Muirfield School, Quarryhill School, Bramble Brae and West Park School. Pupils were taken on a journey through various forms of graphic novels before being given some hints and tips on how to create their own comics.

Two years into our school partnership with metaphrog we are really seeing the benefits of this fantastic partnership. John and Sandra are instantly recognisable around school with our visitors never too busy to chat to the young people about school and their aspirations for the future.

A book fit event the day before saw most pupils in S1 and S2 reading the new *Red Shoes and other Tales* whilst cycling on spin bikes.

Feedback from pupils was very favourable with the dark storylines a sure hit with our readers. Next year we will welcome John and Sandra back to work with the RME department on a project focussing on character development entitled Philosophers Island.

Book Fit

As part of Book Week Scotland the Library ran an all day Book Fit house competition for S1/S2 pupils. Pupils were challenged to cycle on exercise bikes whilst reading *The Red Shoes and Other Tales,* by metaphrog.

Each house group had their own spin bike which they were challenged to keep moving throughout the day. After an impressive start by Mr Hose (Guidance) and Miss Ross (Business Studies), Macbeth took an early lead. This was short lived though with a massive effort by Stewart House pushing them into the lead by an impressive 20km. Wallace house put in a last surge during Period 6 to reduce this lead to only 2km. A tense 30 minute finale ensued with Wallace and Stewart in a serious battle of the bikes. The final winner was Stewart House will an impressive recorded distance of 220km. Wallace were in second place with 216km and Macbeth 170km.

Girls into STEM

On the 30th September, nine S2 girls were invited to Centrica to work with the STEMettes, a national organisation championing women in Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths.

During the day, the girls met staff from both Centrica and the Wood Group who demonstrated what their roles were. They were shown how to prepare to go onto an oil rig, how to clean large oil pipelines and emergency protocols. The girls were also told how a company goes from suspecting oil or gas to be in an area to having a functioning rig set up. Various members of staff, both men and women, discussed their individual roles in the process showing how crucial it is to have a number of people with different skills on such a project. This gave the girls a great opportunity to ask questions about each role and think about whether or not they could someday be working on a similar project.

After a lavish lunch, the group were asked to design a theme park based on all they had learned. Each Northfield Academy pupil teamed up with one from the other

invited school and set to work. Once 3D models were completed on software, six engineers listened to each pair describe their theme park before picking their favourite. Each pupil also had a vote for the People's Choice award, won by Hannah Milne and her partner. The overall winners were Amy Forbes and her partner, who are each to receive a 3D printed copy of their model. Northfield Total Place Pupil Participatory Budgeting

On Friday 20th November as part of Northfield Total Place our pupils took part in another first. All pupils were invited to vote to decide how to best fund activities to enhance the Northfield area for our young people. Aberdeen City Council allocated £30,000 to be used by local groups who could bid for funding using a video clip explaining how they would use the money if it was awarded to them. Columba 1400 Leadership Academy

Northfield Academy again has demonstrated great partnership and vision with their approach to developing staff and students with a view to improving the school image and raising the profile of the school in the local community. Having had experience of the Columba 1400 Leadership Academy Northfield Head teacher, Neil Hendry, challenged Norman Drummond to raise enough funds to support a group from the Academy to undertake the six day course in Staffin on Skye.

Mr Drummond rose to the challenge and so the work began to bring a group of twelve S3 students and four adults together. There was an orientation and interview process for staff in the school that were interested in taking part and orientation sessions for the young people who put themselves forward. The final selection of staff included a member of the Youth Development Team, Colin Lemmon along with Carrie McCune, Cheryl McEwan and Joanne Ross. The young people who were selected were Emma Smith, Chloe Troup, Jade Lawrie, Shaun Milne, Enrique Ferrero-Lopez, Marcel Michewicz, Shannon Gibson, Keira Sleith, Natasha Fraser, Kyle Worrall, Leah Black and Colin Whyte.

The group met at Northfield Academy on the morning of Sunday 20th September where they were picked up by a coach and began the journey to Skye. Six and a half hours and some spectacular scenery later they arrived at Columba 1400 in Staffin. After getting settled in they had a meal around the table with a chance to get to meet some of the Columba staff. They took part in a sharing activity about possibilities then moved on to what would become a regular part of each day – journaling, when they captured the days learning and then finished the day with Talking Stick, a Native American activity similar to circle time. Everyone was in bed by 10.30pm in preparation for the coming week.

Across six days the group worked through the Columban values: Awareness, Focus, Creativity, Integrity, Perseverance and Service by taking part in large group discussions, small group work and presentations. There were more physically challenging activities during the week too such as Search and Rescue, hill walking and canoeing. Each activity was planned to enable leadership, teamwork and communication.

By the last Talking Stick session it was clear that the quieter members of the group had found their voices and the more lively members had learned to control their input and improve their listening skills. The group of loosely connected individuals had become something more – a team with a common purpose.

The week ended with a celebration meal and an award ceremony and the opportunity to leave an encouraging message for the next group and a long journey back to Aberdeen where the work really begins to focussing on efforts that will fit with improving the school image and raising the profile of the school in the local community. Starting in September the Prefects have met on a Tuesday after school to prepare some home baked goodies for the following day. As well as selling home baking and hot drinks, the prefects also prepare a range of activities such as movies, board games, quizzes and crafts. The café has been very successful with approximately 25 – 30 young people of various ages dropping in during the lunchtime. It has also seen a good support from teachers in the school who often pop in for a hot chocolate. We are all excited to see what treats are in store for our Christmas sessions over the next few weeks.

At first my lunchtimes were spent in the Pool Room, observing my new colleagues at work. As time has gone past and my face has become familiar and I never get through a day without interacting with the pupils; whether it's a game of pool, a laugh around the murals at the Social Area Mural Project or a visit from pupils to the office. I now feel that I have started to fit into the team and find my days full.

Northfield Academy Columba 1400 Update

On Thursday 19th of November the Northfield Columbans (that's what we are called) invited staff from across the school to the launch of the Columba 1400 room at Northfield Academy. The purpose of the event was twofold; to raise awareness of the Columba 1400 Group and their mission of improving the school image and raising the profile of the school in the local community and to gather pledges of support from school staff.

Working as a team the students took responsibility for giving up their time to make sure the new room was representative of the time in Skye. This meant many trips up and down stairs to the buckets with old art resources and putting up all the flipchart sheets that recorded the work done at Columba 1400.

The event was opened with a powerpoint presentation of the group's experience in Skye and the plans for the future; keeping the community tidier by ensuring that there are enough rubbish bins between the local shops and the school and to organise and deliver a two day Summer Camp for P5 and 6 pupils from the primary schools in the Northfield Associate Schools Group in 2016.

The presentation was followed by an opportunity for staff to look around the Columba Room and find out about the work that was done while on Skye with the Columba 1400 team. The effort was self-evident in the sheer volume and creativity of the work around the walls.

The group would like to thank all of the school staff that came to the launch event and we look forward to working with you in the future.

Partnerships – BP and John Lewis

All our S2 pupils have had the opportunity to visit the BP Headquarters in Dyce. During their time at BP pupils found out about how fossil fuels are formed and the geology of oil and gas exploration. We then visited the HIVE where, through 3D imagery, the process of getting oil and gas is explained. The science, technology and career opportunities were all explained and future opportunities to work with BP will be available to pupils in S3.





The Senior Enterprise group have been lucky to have an enthusiastic mentor from John Lewis supporting their efforts. They have based their business on jars filled with stationery among other things, perfect for Christmas gifts.
