

# National Parent Conference 2011 'Curriculum for Excellence – One Year On'

## **Conference Report**



The second national conference for parents, organised by the National Parent Forum of Scotland was held in Bishopbriggs Academy in East Dunbartonshire on 1 October 2011. Parents were welcomed by the pupils of Bishopbriggs, who were a credit to their school and their parents. The planning for the Conference was aimed at making all parents feel very welcome and involved in the day and a crèche was available to make sure that parents could relax and take part.

The event was attended by 158 parents and practitioners from across the country and provided parents with an opportunity to hear directly from schools and those on the front line of Curriculum for Excellence. There was the opportunity to ask questions, share ideas and hear what was happening in different parts of the country. Members of Scottish Government, Education Scotland and the Scottish Qualifications Authority (SQA), were on hand throughout the day to chat informally to parents and answer any questions they had about Curriculum for Excellence. As well as providing information, they were keen to hear from parents directly and get a greater understanding of how they could do things better.

Ahead of the event the NPFS also hosted the first ever Scottish online parent conference. This attracted a record number of parents to the <a href="Engage for Education">Engage for Education</a> website and gave a good picture of the issues that were on parents' minds.

Angela Constance, Minister for Children and Young people at the time of the conference, provided the opening speech followed by a question and answer session. Questions came in via Glow and twitter from parents who were unable to attend on the day.

The Minister described her ambitions and aspirations for children and young people in Scotland and their families, and spoke of the importance she places on parents getting the right information about Curriculum for Excellence and more generally. She launched some new resources for parents, including, the SQA parent information leaflet, new resources for Parent Councils and information on the new P7 profiles. In recognition of the important role that she saw Parent Councils having in schools, she announced her intention to have weekly telephone calls with Chairs across the country, so that she could hear directly about how parents are involved in their schools.

Parents had the opportunity to choose from a wide range of seminars covering different aspects of Curriculum for Excellence. The seminars were presented by parents and schools, the Scottish Qualifications Authority, Education Scotland and the General Teaching Council of Scotland. There were also two breakout discussion groups which focused on improving the use of ICT in schools, and the particular challenges faced by parents of children with Additional Support Needs.

A very entertaining and stimulating closing speech was given by David Cameron (Education Consultant). He talked about how impressed he was with the NPFS and how they were already making a difference, not just in engaging with those in power in Scottish Education, but in their efforts to maintain a dialogue with parents and Parent Councils. He also shared his thoughts on the importance of achieving a worthwhile education system, which recognised the child and built the learning around them – an education system that allowed children to learn how to create, innovate, manage risk, and become capable as well as qualified, shaping their future.
