This could be a painter, sculptor, or even a musician, actor or dancer. Use the planner on the blog to list facts about him/her and then present these in a short biography which should be written in your jotter. Remember to choose someone who is well-known, otherwise you may not be able to find many details about their life. 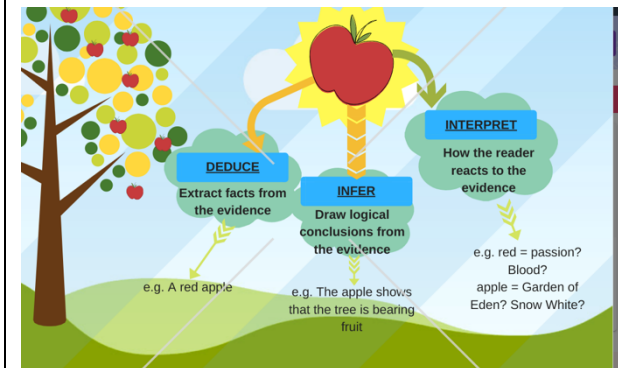
Become a Scriptwriter (Spicy/Hot)
