Food, Families, Futures Project

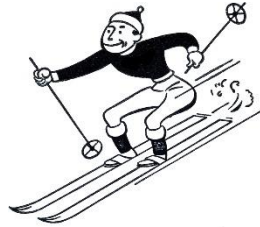
We have started our after school Supper Club with great success. Families have been involved preparing a meal for all and a variety of learning opportunities with our community partners, such as:

Head Lice

It can be extremely upsetting and frustrating for those children and families when head lice are found. Unfortunately this is a common occurrence in all schools however this session we seem to have been particularly badly affected.

I have written out to parents/ carers in the past asking for vigilance and where head lice are found that they be treated immediately. I have also asked that children’s hair be routinely checked i.e. every couple of days to ensure that the head lice do not get a chance to breed.

I have consulted with the School Nurse for further advice however, I am limited in the action that I can take regarding this problem. Where I am informed that a child has head lice which have

obviously not been treated, I will contact the parents/ carers directly to highlight the issue and to ensure that treatment takes place.

By working together, I am sure that we can make a difference to reduce the number of incidences. Once finalised, we will publish our remits in full.
