"Farewell" from the Director of Education, Dundee City Council

I have had the great privilege of managing aspects of service delivery in the Education Department since 2000, first in Support for Learning, then in secondary education, and latterly leading the Department for the last two and a half years. As I approach the end of my working career I look back fondly and with a deep sense of gratitude over my time in a job I have always wanted to do and which I have found hugely rewarding.

The rewards come when you see young people so obviously enjoying the work they are doing in class, a young person developing in confidence to the extent of being able to sustain a major role on stage, staff and pupils enjoying a new school, a youngster with additional support needs finding success, a member of staff seeking and gaining promotion, or an NQT who has grown very fond of Dundee and its schools and is desperate to remain here. The list is endless.

I was born in Dundee and educated in Dundee. I have spent the majority of my working life in this city and it holds a special place in my heart. From my time as a fledgling teacher right through to my final post of Director of Education, I have always been fiercely ambitious for Dundee's young people. I have wanted to drive our young people and have been determined to see them achieve to their highest potential. It always saddened me to see some of our young people failing to derive tangible benefits from their time in education, but I am equally delighted that we have turned that corner and are now seeing real sustained improvements in attainment.

The city of Dundee has many challenges it must face, but it is doing so with spirit and verve and the positive results are there to see around us. That is the case as much in education as it is in wider Dundee society. Our implementation of the Curriculum for Excellence is powerful, our devotion to the needs of the more vulnerable in our society is sound, our nurturing of our very young and our appreciation of the need to give them the most secure start if life is unquestioned, and our care and attention to the personal and academic development of all our young people is unstinting.

I have always maintained that we are, alone, unable to achieve all we set out to achieve, especially in these demanding times. Our various partnerships have therefore been very important to us, not least that with parents. The vast majority of parents want their children to do well, and want to work with us to help them do well. I have been so proud to have helped develop such a successful partnership with the parent body, and I have appreciated the cooperation and assistance of parents. Our partnership has been mutually beneficial, as it should be.

These are momentous times in the world of education. It is doubtful if there has ever been a time when so many major initiatives and plans and reviews have either been undertaken or are currently on the stocks, and all at a time when the financial context is difficult and unlikely to improve. I joined a profession and I have tried to act professionally through my working life. If all our members of staff continue to show that strong sense of professionalism that I see as I go around Dundee's schools, we will adapt to changes and we will not lose sight of our raison d'etre, which is to support young children to develop into responsible adults ready to take their places in society.

I may be retiring from an active role in education, but I can assure you I shall watch with great interest educational developments in Dundee. I offer each and every one of you my sincere best wishes for your success and happiness in the years to come.
