Curriculum Rationale

The curriculum in St. Andrew's Primary is defined as the totality of the experiences each child receives in their learning.

Its purpose is to offer a coherent, broad, general education throughout, but one that is grounded in several key themes.

The curriculum is embedded within an ethos of Catholic Christianity and its impact on community. It focuses on enabling our young people to be literate and numerate. It provides a progressive approach to developing creative, cooperative, imaginative, lifelong learners who communicate confidently and embrace the challenge of solving problems (in their widest sense) in an increasingly skilled manner.

The curriculum actively promotes fitness and health, inclusion, charity and tolerance.

It does all this within an ongoing commitment to making learning fun for children, engaging them through technologies and maximizing their talents and those of adults within the context of our school, community and wider world.

Through and ongoing commitment from children and adults within our community we will continue to adjust and develop our thinking around our aims and curriculum in order to adapt to the changing needs of our community.

How the School Works

Class Organisation

Since opening over ten years ago the school population has grown by around one third. With that growth has come increased class sizes. It has also meant we have had a mixture of composite and straight classes during that time. When we have to composite classes we do so in line with local authority guidance.

Positive Behaviour and Celebrating Success

We believe that everyone has something positive to offer and we all have potential to be realised. We believe that positive behaviour and celebrating success are closely linked. As a school we continually endeavour to improve how we encourage positive behaviour through celebrating success. That may be from the level of weekly assemblies where we gather to celebrate success in our lives to how we encourage and guide our young people in resolving problems. We all need more positives than negatives in our lives. We need hope when we are feeling bad about ourselves. It is the role of all (with particular emphasis on adults) to build children's learning resilience that comes from getting this balance correct. A positive, productive working relationship between home and school is key. Our parents are valued and through our curriculum, reporting and parental engagement our shared understanding of where our children are doing well and what we can do to help them means that we build a community of young people who have the learning resilience to be able to deal positively with the challenges of learning in life, including school.

All Dumfries and Galloway schools must have a dress code which encourages pupils to dress in a way appropriate to attendance at school.

This code must not lead to direct or indirect discrimination on the grounds of race, religion, gender, or disability. Prior to drawing up the dress code, parents, pupils and staff should be fully consulted and it is the expectation of Education Services that parents will be supportive of the dress code.

Clothing which is unacceptable in school under any circumstances would include items which:

- Could potentially encourage factions (eg football colours).
- Could cause offence (eg antireligious or political slogans).
- Could cause health and safety difficulties such as loose fitting clothing, dangling earrings.
- Are of flammable materials which may be a danger in certain classes.
- Could cause damage to floors.

School Clothing grants

Pre-ordering lunch

All menus are nutritionally analysed, offering a fantastic choice and flexibility. Primary schools have introduced an advanced pre order system for lunch. Pre order forms are handed out to all pupils.

Special dietary requirements

For food allergy and intolerances; medically prescribed diets; or diets for religious or cultural reasons specific meals for children of different ethnic origin may be catered for. Ask the school for a registration form or call 030 33 33 3000 and ask for Facilities Operations (Catering)

Free School Meals

Free School Meals are provided for all pupils in Primary 1, 2 and 3. Younger children at nursery or older pupils at primary may also be eligible for free school meals in certain situations as well as those families on qualifying benefits.

Attendance

It is your responsibility as parents to ensure that your child/children attend school regularly. For the safety of all children it is important for you to telephone the school office prior to/at the beginning of the absence. Absences are recorded in class registers and frequent or irregular absences not supported by a reasonable excuse, will be notified to parents and the matter may be referred to the Opportunities for All Service. If possible please, try to make dental/medical appointments outwith school hours. However, if this is not possible please inform us in writing or by telephone of the appointment and arrange to collect your child from class.

Absence from School

Pupils who need to leave school during the school day ie doctor /dentist appointments, must be collected by a named contact confirmed with the school office. They must also report to the school office on their return to school.

Curriculum for Excellence

Broad General Education

Children and young people work their way through Experiences and Outcomes in each of the five Curriculum Levels (Early, First, Second, Third, Fourth) and in each of the eight Curricular Areas. The five Curricular Levels span pre-school to the end of S3. This is the Broad General Education. Pupils progress at their own pace, working through the Experiences and Outcomes of the most appropriate level for them. Pupils will be supported in collecting evidence of their achievements, with a profile of these being produced in P7 and S3.

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Curriculum For Excellence (CfE)

Curriculum for Excellence (CfE) is bringing learning to life in the way education is delivered for all 3-18 year olds – in nursery, primary, secondary, at college, workplace or community learning. It takes a fresh approach to what, how and where young people learn. It aims to raise standards, improve knowledge and develop skills, closing the gap between the lowest and highest performers.

Ultimately it aims to nurture young people as successful learners, confident individuals, effective contributors and responsible citizens.

We endeavour to achieve this through a joined up approach to learning, that suits the learner, is engaging for them and relevant to their life.

Homework/Family Learning

Homework is planned on a weekly basis. Notification of homework should give you time to plan for its completion around your family life that week. Homework should reflect what your child has been learning. Homework should provide an opportunity to build a routine at home that suits the family. It is a support to learning. Homework will focus mainly on the key areas of literacy and numeracy but will involve other areas from time to time, reflecting class areas of interest being covered in other areas of the curriculum. These may also provide opportunities for families to learn, enquire, discover or make things together.

Being organised in our approach to homework is key, from school to home. It encourages children to take responsibility for their own learning, understand the importance of personal organisation and prepares them for the increased demands of secondary school and later life.

Our Accelerated Reading scheme enables the results of progress quizzes to be shared with home on the day your child takes the quiz.

How is my child doing?

There will be several opportunities for you to discuss your child's progress. This may be through informal discussion with the teacher or at Parents' Nights/ Learning Conversations, formal reports or for some it may be through more formal, focussed meetings with other agencies.

School Improvements

In May/June of each year, the school publishes a Standards & Quality Report providing all stakeholders with a comprehensive summary of the school's work and learners' achievements over the last year. The first part of this report provides an overview of the school's progress in addressing its key priorities, while the second part gives information about, for example, how well pupils are learning and achieving; how well the school is supporting children/young people to develop and learn. In June, we publish a School Improvement Plan which outlines the key priorities for the school during the year ahead, following engagement with staff, pupils and parents.

School Standards and Quality Reports are produced annually. The School Improvement Plan is produced as a result of that process. These are submitted to local and national government as required. We share prioritise with our whole school community via our Parent Forum, information screens in school etc. Online consultation questionnaires for parents will play part of this process in the coming year.

Provision for improved expression of feeling sand emotions, cooperative working through science, technology, engineering and maths skills and improved monitoring and tracking practices are some of the more recent improvements to our school's day to day business.

Some improvements we are working on this year include finding ways to widen the meaningful contribution stakeholders have in our improvements, improving awareness of skills for life and work/ employability as well as improving collaboration with schools outside of Dumfries and Galloway.

All improvements depend on effective collaboration within our school community. We will continue to try to look for improvements in this area as we always have.

Health and Safety

Emergency Procedures

If your child feels ill during the school day and we feel that he/she would be better at home, we will telephone you or your emergency contact. Minor accidents, e.g. cuts, bruises, are dealt with by the school staff. Serious accidents are few, but should one occur your child will be immediately taken either to your doctor or to hospital, if necessary, and you or your emergency contact will be notified. We cannot stress enough the importance of supplying the school with the relevant information we require in such a situation, i.e. your own home and work number and a telephone number of an emergency contact. Please remember that if your child stays in more than one home setting contact details should take account of this.

Severe Weather and School Closure Arrangements

Headteachers are authorised to make an emergency closure when the state of the weather or any other exceptional circumstance make it necessary in the best interests of the pupils. In these circumstances parents will be communicated with in a variety of ways including text messages/ phone calls and emergency contact arrangements. All school closures will be notified on the Council Website.
