


Science Challenge

Big Cats Identification Key

1. Look at the 5 photographs of big cats and use the questions in the key below to help you identify them. Write their names in the box.




2. Make your own key based on the visible characteristics (features) of the 4 dogs below. Use a layout like the one in the image on the right. Choose your questions carefully.

Technology Challenge

Cat Calendar

Adult Support Required

Your task is to make yourself a cat calendar for the month of April.

You will need: A computer or tablet with access to the internet and access to a word processing program such as *Word*.

Instructions:

1. Open a Word document

2. Add a Text box by clicking Insert on the toolbar then clicking on Text Box on the right-hand side of the toolbar. Choose the 1st option –

Simple Text Box.







3. Right click and **cut** to remove the text from the box.

4. Search for 'cat clipart' on your internet browser. Find an image that you like. Right click and choose the **copy image** option.

5. Go back to your word document. Right click inside your text box and click the 3rd **paste** option to add your picture.

6. Return to the internet and this time search for a 'free printable April 2022 calendar'. Look through the calendars and pick one you like. Right click to copy it. Then

go back to your Word document. Paste it below your text box.

7. Click on one of the circles at the corners to stretch out the calendar to make it bigger.

8. Save your work. (Ask an adult if you need help with this)

If you have a printer at home, you can now print off your calendar if you like, or you can make further adaptions to your work. Remember to save as you go. You may want to colour your cat using **Draw** on the tool bar or you might want to add a frame or background colour and or move the position of the calendar. Ask a grown up or an older brother or sister (if you have one) if you need further support.

Note: If you don't have computer access, you can still draw your own calendar. Use a ruler to draw the lines for the box and grid lines.



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Engineering Challenge

Walking Paper Cat or Dog

Adult Supervision Required

Challenge: Can you create a paper cat or dog that can walk on its own?

You will need: paper, card, scissors, ruler, colouring pens / pencils (optional), a surface on a slight incline (slope)

Remember to ask for help with scissors.

Create it:

Draw your own template on paper or card. Cut it out. Cut into the legs stopping at the body. Fold the head and tail up and the legs down.


Test it: Steady your dog on the top of a slope and let it walk down on its own. Does it work? Does it walk smoothly or is it lopsided? Does it fall over?

Improve it: Can you make any adjustments to the template or folds to improve how your dog walks? Does it work better on paper or on card? Can you add any extra features to make it more balanced? Can you decorate it to make it more like a cat or dog?

Things to think about: Can you link any feature to improved / more efficient walking? Do the angles on the legs make it rock side to side? Does gravity pull it down the ramp? Does the incline of your ramp need to change? Does the friction on the ramp need to change? Does the angle of the legs need to change? How does the template size affect the ability of it to walk? Would sticking on extras, like a bigger head, make a difference? Can you get your cat or dog to walk on a flat surface by attaching a string or thread you could pull?

Why not make more than 1 walking cat or dog, decorate them differently then have fun racing them with an adult at home or a brother or sister. Add different features to each one.





Allergies and Medicines

Do you know what an allergy is? Maybe you have one yourself? People can be allergic to many different things. Some people are allergic to foods like nuts, or fruits like kiwis or strawberries. Some people are allergic to dust or to pollen from plants and trees and some people are allergic to animals and / or insects. **Common animal allergies are to cats and dogs and to horses.**

What is an allergic reaction?

Your body has an **immune system** which is responsible for defending you against bacteria and viruses. Sometimes your immune system will defend against substances that usually don't pose a threat to the human body. These substances are known as **allergens**. The body reacts to these allergens by making proteins and releasing chemicals into the bloodstream. One of these chemicals is called **histamine**. It causes the symptoms that you notice.

The allergen is often called a **trigger** and the way it enters the body can vary. The route could be touching – like stroking a cat or dog, by eating a specific food or by breathing it in like pollen, dust or dander (tiny skin cells shed from an animal's skin).

How to treat an allergy

Antihistamines, which work against the histamine your body has produced, are medicines often used to relieve some of the **common** symptoms of allergies, like hives (itchy rash like tiny blisters), watery eyes, runny and /or blocked nose, sneezing and scratchy throat. Most antihistamines can be bought from pharmacies and shops, but some are only available on prescription from a doctor. They come in several different forms – including tablets, capsules, liquids, syrups, creams, lotions, gels, eyedrops and nasal sprays. People with severe allergies (**anaphylaxis**) have very serious symptoms and often carry an **EpiPen** which is injected.

Medicines can make us feel fit and well but if we take the wrong ones, or the wrong amounts, they can be incredibly dangerous. Only take medicines which are given to you by a trusted adult. Don't help yourself to any medicine you see lying around. Stay safe!

Social Studies Challenge



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Dog Soldiers

Wars have been fought throughout history and it hasn't only been humans that have been involved. From carrying supplies to providing company for fighting soldiers, animals have played an important part during conflicts and have helped humans in many ways.



Some animals that have helped during wars include horses, dogs, cats, elephants and even pigeons.

Think about: How having a dog might affect how a scared soldier felt?



This photograph was taken during World War 1. What job do you think this dog might have had? Why do you think they may be doing that job?

Medical dogs were used on the battlefront to get medical kits to injured soldiers. They were quick and agile which meant they had a better chance of getting to the injured than humans. Their kits would contain the basic equipment a soldier could use to attend to his wounds himself. For example, a medical kit might have plasters and bandages in it.

Dogs are very good at smelling. How do you think this might have been useful in the war?

Dogs were used to sniff out the enemy and warn soldiers if any enemy soldiers were approaching. They would also sniff out rats and other vermin in the trenches and were even used to sniff out mines and bombs (this is something they still do today).



Think about:

- 1. How the sounds of gunfire might make a soldier feel?
- 2. How the sounds of gunfire might make a dog feel?
