

Science Challenge



Clean the Leprechaun's Coins

Adult Supervision Required

St. Patrick's Day is on Thursday 17th March and Irish folklore tells us that fairies, called leprechauns, put a pot of shiny coins at the end of each rainbow which they then guard.



Coins become dirty over time so how could a leprechaun keep his coins shiny and clean? Let's find out.

You will need: white vinegar, salt, water, 2 bowls with a good size bottom base, a teaspoon, paper towels or kitchen roll, discoloured 1p and 2p coins

Instructions:

- 1. Fill 2 small bowls with about 1/4 cup of vinegar and a teaspoon of salt each. Mix thoroughly.
- 2. Before dropping the discoloured coins into the bowl, take one and dip it halfway into the bowl. Count to 10 slowly and pull it out. What happened?
- **3.** Add a few more coins and let them sit for a few minutes. What can you see happening? (Make sure to add the same number of discoloured coins to the other bowl too.)
- **4.** Now, take the coins from one bowl, rinse them in running tap water and let them dry on a paper towel. Take the other pennies from the other bowl and place them directly on another paper towel without rinsing them first. Let's wait an hour and see what happens. **Make a prediction** what do you think will happen? **Talk to an adult at home about it**.
- **5.** Can you see any differences between the two groups of coins, the rinsed and unrinsed pennies? Do you now have some green and/or shiny coins?

Extension: Substitute the vinegar for lemon or lime juice which is also acidic. Do you think this will have a greater cleaning effect than the vinegar? Why? Test it out and see.

The Science: Coins in the UK – 1ps and 2ps, are made mostly from a metal called copper. Copper is shiny and bright but when the tiny particles (atoms) in the copper mix with oxygen atoms in the air, copper oxide is formed giving the coins a dull greenish grey dirty colour. Adding the coins to the mixture of salt and vinegar, which is a mild acid, should dissolve the copper oxide revealing the original shiny clean metal below.

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Digital Flower Still Life

Adult Support Required

Spring is the season of new life for both animals and plants. It is lovely to see the flowers starting to grow as they bring back some colour to the world.

Your task: is to create a digital flower still life. You will do this by drawing some flowers and altering them with a photo editing program.

You will need: drawing materials (pens / pencils), white paper, construction paper, scanner or camera, computer or tablet, printer, scissors, glue,

Instructions:

- 1. Draw your flowers individually along with a vase on white paper.
- **2.** Take a digital photo or scan your flower and vase drawings.
- 3. Edit your flower and vase photos with a photo editing program. You may have one installed on your computer at home but if not PicMonkey is a good one and its free!
 - https://www.picmonkey.com/photo-editor (You will need an email address to sign up ask an adult)
- **4.** Print your flowers and vase and cut out with scissors.
- **5.** Arrange and glue your flowers and vase on to a piece of construction (or scrapbook) paper. Use different coloured paper to create a pattern for the background behind the flowers and a darker coloured paper for the table that is behind the vase.

Note: this activity is challenging.

Tips:

- 1. If you don't have a camera or scanner, you could create your flower picture using **Word** and the **Draw** tool then print out as described.
- 2. If you don't have access to a printer, create your images as described and save them. You can still create your still life by drawing the flowers first.

Engineering Challenge



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Build a Bird Nest

Adult Supervision Required

In the Spring, birds start to build their nests ready to lay their eggs.

Challenge: Build a nest to provide a safe, strong and warm place for a bird to lay a new clutch of eggs.

Plan it: Write down or sketch some ideas as to how you will construct the nest.

Build it: Using twigs (thick and thin), grass, wool, strips of paper, old rags, etc.

Test it: If your first design doesn't work, evaluate (try to work out) what went wrong and try again.

Reflect: Will your nest make a suitable home. Look up information about different types of nests and how they are constructed. Could you make it bigger / smaller, smoother with less jagged twigs sticking into the middle, could it be warmer – how could you 'insulate' it further?

Improve it: Use your reflections to improve your nest.

Can you find somewhere outside to place your nest when you have built it?

Extension: Take a photograph of your finished nest with a toy in it. If you can, paste the photo onto a **Word** document and type up a short explanation of what it is and how you built the nest. Remember to give your document a name before saving it. Ask a grown up for help if you need to.

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
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Weather Forecast

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Silent Letters

What You Need: The Silent Letter Bingo Board (below), a counter, dice, piece of paper, pencil, answer grid and a partner (optional)

Instructions: Write the numbers 1 -20 down the left-hand side of your paper. Roll the dice and move your counter the appropriate number of spaces. Read the question out loud and say the answer. Write your answer on your paper at the appropriate number. When you get to number 20 (Home) try to find your answers in the answer grid - did you get them right and did you spell them correctly? If not rub them out or put a line through them and start the game again. Can you spell the word correctly next time? Keep going until all the words have been written down correctly.

If you play with a partner, you can both write down your answers or you could spell the words out loud with the other person checking them. The winner is the first person to get all the spellings correct.





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Vivaldi: The Four Seasons

Antonio Vivaldi

Born: 1678Died: 1741

• Nationality: Italian

Musical Period: Baroque









Why was he a Trailblazer? Can orchestras bring people, animals, landscapes and stories to life – using music? Trailblazer Antonio Vivaldi thought so.

Around 300 years ago when he wrote **The Four Seasons**, he was one of the first people to compose music that was designed to remind listeners of places and things in the world around them. The Four Seasons, as you can probably guess, is made up of four different movements: Spring, Summer, Autumn and Winter. Each movement sounds different and represents the season they are named after, for example *Spring* is full of energy in a **major key signature**, whereas *Winter* sounds harsh and is in a **minor key**.
