

Science Challenge



The Invisible Penny

In Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone, Harry receives a gift of an invisibility cloak and when he wears it, he becomes invisible. In real life, sometimes things can appear invisible due to the way light behaves. Let's investigate this:

You Will Need: 2 coins, 2 clear glasses and some water (try to make the coins and glasses as similar to each other as possible to make this a fair test)

Instructions:

- 1. Place one coin underneath a glass and place the other coin inside the other glass. Can you still see the coins?
- 2. Now pour some water into the glasses (the same amount in each) and watch from side on (not from above) - what happens to the coins? Can you still see them?

The Science: Light (from the sun, or an artificial light) travels in a straight line, bounces off objects and into our eyes, allowing us to see things. Generally, there is little or no refraction of light as it travels through air.

However, when you pour water into the glass the light is refracted (it 'bends') and doesn't make it to your eyes which is why the coin seems to disappear.

Light = type of energy that travels in a straight line from a light source

Reflection = When light bounces off an object

Refraction = When a light wave changes direction as it moves from one material to another

Extension: Try the activity using different objects under the glass – does it matter if they are shiny or not? Why do you think that might be? Does it matter how much water you put in the glass? What happens if you view the glass from a different position – above the glass, side on etc.?

Can you think of a situation where it might be useful to appear invisible - talk to an adult

about it.

Technology Challenge



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Magic Wand Paper Craft

All wizards and witches need their own wands. Today's task is to make your own wand using paper. You will need to use a variety of folds and rolls to get your wand to 'open up' like magic!

You Will Need: several different pieces of paper (different colours), pencil, ruler, scissors, glue, piece of wool, string or thread, coloured pencils / pens, embellishments to decorate your wand (optional) (Adult supervision for scissors)



Instructions:

- 1. Put 4 pieces of paper together (different colours) and using your ruler draw a rectangle using one of the sides. (Approximately 15cm x 8cm)
- 2. Cut out your coloured rectangles. (Be careful using scissors)
- 3. Now fold each piece several times, back and forth, to make a fan.
- **4.** Glue the edge of one piece to the next, until all your paper is glued together into one long folding piece.
- 5. Now cut a piece of A4 paper in half (width ways)
- **6.** Fold your 'fan' back together and place the end (about 1cm) onto the top of your white paper. Roll it together and secure the end of the entire piece of white paper with some glue.



- 7. Cut your wool in half and glue the end of each piece to each outer inside edge of your fan.
- **8.** Now take your other half from your white paper and cut about 1/3 from it (widthways). Wrap this around the middle of your wand, securing the end with glue. This wrapped piece should not be stuck to your wand as it needs to be able to move up and down. Push it to the top of the wand, over the fan, and ensure that the wool is hanging down each side, over the top. Glue the wool in place.
- **9.** Now take a strip of ccloured paper, the same width as your moveable piece, and wrap it around the moveable piece and wool. Glue the edge in place. Cut the remaining visible wool.



- **10.** Decorate your wand using the pens, pencils and embellishments if you choose. Now leave to dry for 10 minutes.
- **11.** To activate your 'magic' wand, pull down gently on the coloured paper at the top your wand should be activated. Well done!

Your Task: Recreate an image of Hogwarts using chalk.

You Will Need: pencil, black paper, selection of chalks /chalk pastels

Instructions:

- 1. Draw the outline of Hogwarts onto black paper using pencil. Think about the shapes that you can see.
- 2. Create the sky. Use blue, white, yellow, pink/purple, and black chalk. (Charcoal) Remember to leave a space for the moon, and to leave lots of black in the sky- it looks better like this! Use your fingers to blend and smudge the colours into one another. You could put lightning in too!
- **3.** Add in the moon. Use white chalk. You could add a bit of yellow or blue as well. Only smudge it a bit.
- **4.** Add in the lighter parts on the buildings. Use white and yellow, and blend the colours in. You want to leave a lot of the building black!
- **5.** Finally, add in the windows. They are white and yellow. Don't smudge them you want them to really stand out!

Note: You can get very messy using chalks. You might want to wear old clothing and / or an apron, and keep away from soft furnishings at home. Wash your hands when you have finished and try not to touch anything other than your artwork until you have completed your task
