How the School Works

Positive Behaviour and Celebrating Success

The school reviews its 'Promoting Positive Behaviour Policy' on an ongoing basis. This policy is available to parents/carers on request and details the procedures that have been agreed to ensure the highest possible standards of behaviour.

The school has clear expectations concerning behaviour, but the primary aim of the positive behaviour policy is to promote good relationships so that the full school community can work together with the common purpose of helping everyone to learn. Each class has its own Classroom Code, which is agreed by the children and closely linked to the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child.

At Belmont Primary, a variety of strategies are used to reward positive behaviour and celebrate success. This ranges from verbal praise and informal recognition of achievement, to formal rewards through our Celebrating Success Assemblies, Pupil of the Week, Pride of Belmont Award and other achievement certificates. We also recognise and celebrate children's wider achievements in assemblies, on the School App and our social media channels.

School uniform

Grants and Bursaries

Scottish Child Payment

Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family. It's a weekly payment of £25 that you can get for every child you look after who's under 16 years of age. You'll get the payment every 4 weeks if your application is successful.

Best Start Grant

Best Start Grant and Best Start Foods are payments that help towards the costs of being pregnant or looking after a child. Best Start Grant is made up of 3 one-off payments:

- Pregnancy and Baby Payment
- Early Learning Payment
- School Age Payment

Best Start Foods is a prepaid card that can be used in shops or online to buy healthy foods like milk or fruit. The payments you can get now will depend on:

- how far along in your pregnancy you are
- how old your child is

Clothing Grant

The award of clothing grants is to assist with the cost of school clothing for families who are on a qualifying benefit or on low income. The current award is presently £134 per primary school child and £150 per secondary school child.

School Meals

The Naturally D&G local provenance for a sustainable future ensures that meals are freshly prepared with seasonal ingredients and are free from undesirable additives.

Free School Meals

Free school meals are provided for all pupils in Primary 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5. Confirmation of when this will be rolled out to Primary 6 and Primary 7 from the Scottish Government has yet to be confirmed.

In Nursery, eligible children can receive up to 1140 hours a year of Early Learning and Childcare. As part of this funded offer, the child will be entitled to one free meal and a snack each day.

Online pre-ordering of school meals is currently being rolled out to all secondary schools, information will be supplied by your school.

Free school meals can lead to a large saving in each year, nursery and primary school pupils can save £361 and secondary school pupils can save £370. You'll also be helping your child's school if you qualify for free school meals. Some Scottish Government funding provided directly to schools is linked to the number of pupils who are entitled to free school meals.

Special Dietary Requirements

Facilities Services – Catering provide special dietary requirements for food allergy and intolerances; medically prescribed diets; or diets for religious or cultural reasons specific meals for children of different ethnic origin. Simply ask the school for a Special Diet Request Forms to allow us to inform the catering team who will discuss your child's requirements in full. All Children with allergens should register with the catering team as soon as they are aware that their child has an allergen or intolerance to food.

Scottish Child Payment and Bridging Payments

The Scottish Government's Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family and, as of 14 November 2022, applications are now open for all children under the age of 16. The weekly value of this award will also increase to £25 as of this point.

Free Travel for 5 - 22 year olds

From 31 January 2022 all children and young people aged 5-22 will be entitled to free bus travel in Scotland. You can apply for free travel online from today at www.getyournec.scot (This cannot be done through your school)

Attendance

It is your responsibility as parents to ensure that your child/children attend school regularly. For the safety of all children it is important for you to telephone the school office prior to/at the beginning of the absence. Absences are recorded in class registers and frequent or irregular absences not supported by a reasonable excuse, will be notified to parents and the matter may be referred to the Opportunities for All Service. If possible please, try to make dental/medical appointments outwith school hours. However, if this is not possible please inform us in writing or by telephone of the appointment and arrange to collect your child from class.

Absence from School

Pupils who need to leave school during the school day ie doctor /dentist appointments, must be collected by a named contact confirmed with the school office. They must also report to the school office on their return to school.

Curriculum for Excellence

Curriculum for Excellence (CfE), now known as 'Scotland's Curriculum,' is bringing learning to life in the way education is delivered for all 3-18 year olds in nursery, primary, secondary, at college and via workplace or community learning. It aims to respond and adapt flexibly to meet the needs of an ever changing and evolving world and Scotland's place within it. At its heart lies a constant commitment and drive towards excellence and equity, to raise standards, improve knowledge, develop skills for all learners and close the gap between the lowest and highest achievers by ensuring everyone has an equal opportunity to be successful, no matter what their background or circumstances. Ultimately, it aims to nurture children and young people as successful learners, confident individuals, effective contributors and responsible citizens.

Broad General Education

Children and young people work their way through Experiences and Outcomes in each of the five Curriculum Levels (Early, First, Second, Third, Fourth) and in each of the eight Curricular Areas. The five Curricular Levels span pre-school to the end of S3. This is the Broad General Education. Pupils progress at their own pace, working through the Experiences and Outcomes of the most appropriate level for them. Pupils will be supported in collecting evidence of their achievements, with a profile of these being produced in P7 and S3.

CfE also includes Languages, Expressive arts, Religious and moral education, Sciences, Social studies and Technologies. The responsibility for the curriculum offer in your school sits with the Headteacher.

The school has internal space for physical education and has a full range of equipment for the teaching of body movement skills and simple games skills. The school playground (hard surface) allows such activities to be carried on outdoors should the weather permit. A Multi-Use Games Area (M.U.G.A.) is available and consists of a fenced off, two tennis court size surface with run-out areas and recessed football goals.

Various extra-curricular activities, including a Breakfast Club, are offered by school staff, Active Schools, parent volunteers and coaches in the local community. The school is indebted to the hard-working group of adults - staff, parents/carers and friends of the school - who are prepared to devote their expertise and time for the good of our children and ultimately that of the community at large. Parents/carers wishing to be of assistance in our extra-curricular activities are asked to contact the school.

Primary 7 benefit from curling tuition at the North West Castle, participate in Bikeability and experience an outdoor adventure residential experience. Swimming lessons are provided for children in Primary 4.

How is my child doing?

There will be several opportunities for you to discuss your child's progress. This may be through informal discussion with the teacher or at Parents' Nights/ Learning Conversations, formal reports or for some it may be through more formal, focussed meetings with other agencies.

Helping Your Child and Family Learning

Homework was reviewed throughout Session 2023/2024, with pupils and parents/carers invited to participate in this exercise through surveys.

Homework can have an important place in supporting the curriculum offered by this school and should be seen as a meaningful extension of what is done at school. With this in mind, parents/carers are asked to practise certain exercises at home e.g. colour recognition, counting, times tables, spelling etc. In the case of our younger learners, it is particularly helpful if parents/carers can listen to and be familiar with their child's reading. Parents/carers of all children are further asked to provide material, time and opportunity for children to read a variety of texts.

If homework is causing difficulty or anxiety for a child, parents/carers should contact the class teacher in the first instance.



Support for All

Support for Learners

All children receive support at school and nursery to help them learn. 'Additional support for learning' is how we describe any support that is extra or different to the help that most children receive. Most of this additional support is provided by teachers in mainstream classes, focussed on learning and support to be fully involved in school life. For the majority of children and young people this will be delivered in a mainstream classroom supported by their classroom teacher for a few this will mean some additional support alongside the classroom teacher, and for a very few this will be part-time or full-time provision in a school with a learning centre or an inclusion base.

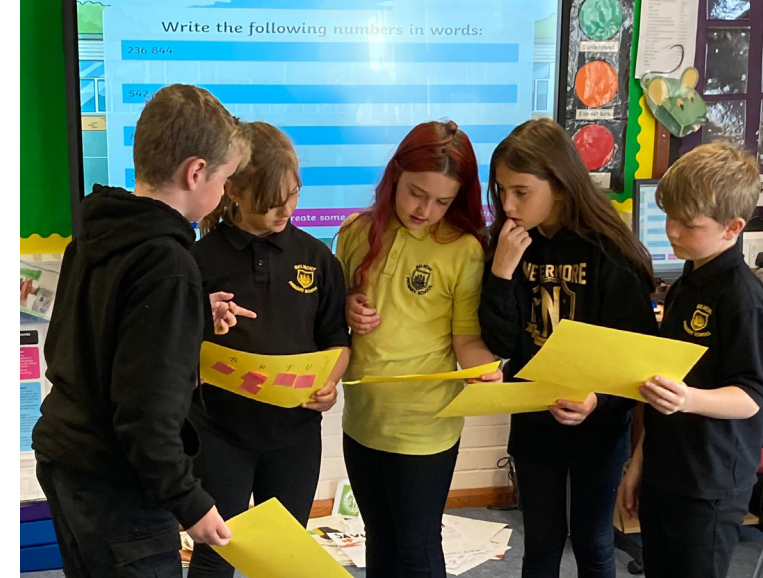
School Improvements

Each year the school will publish a School Improvement Plan which outlines the key priorities for the school during the year ahead, following engagement with staff, pupils and parents. The plan indicates the expected impact of priorities on pupil learning, as well as providing brief information about the key tasks to be taken forward. In Session 2024/2025, Belmont Primary's 'School Improvement Plan' Priorities are as follows:

Priority 1 - Raising Attainment & Achievement

Priority 2 – Engaging Parents/Carers and Families



Pupil Equity Funding (PEF) is additional funding allocated directly to schools and targeted at reducing the poverty-related attainment gap. PEF is allocated on the basis of free school meal registration, however headteachers can use their professional judgement to identify children who may benefit from targeted interventions and approaches. The school utilises PEF to provide targeted support for children, focusing on improvement activity in literacy, numeracy and health and wellbeing.

Universally, additional learning assistant input made available to classes across the school has supported Curriculum for Excellence Performance as evidenced at P.1, P.4 and P.7. Our school's performance in Reading, Writing and Maths is generally in advance of both the Stranraer Cluster and Dumfries and Galloway averages.

In addition, specific interventions: Talking, Listening and Questioning (T.L.Q.), Closing the Literacy Gap (CtLG) and Closing the Numeracy Gap (CtNG) have been instrumental in improving attainment and achievement for identified individuals and groups of learners.

Health and Safety

Emergency Procedures (including Safer Together Guidance)

If your child feels unwell or have hurt themselves during the school day they must report this to an adult in the school. If we feel that they would be better at home we will telephone you or your emergency contact. Minor accidents, e.g. cuts, bruises, are dealt with by the school staff. Serious accidents are few, but should one occur your child will be immediately taken either to your doctor or to hospital, if necessary, and you or your emergency contact will be notified. We cannot stress enough the importance of supplying the school with the relevant information we require in such a situation, i.e. your own home and work number and a telephone number of an emergency contact. **Please remember that if your child stays in more than one home setting contact details should take account of this.**

Health Care (inc First Aid)

Many children will require their health care needs to be met at sometime within the nursery/school environment, for most children this will be for short periods of time only, but for some children this may require more long-term planning and support. If your child has any health care needs, please contact the school to discuss arrangements. Full details of the support available and your role as a parent and the role of your child are contained within Health Care in Schools 3-18 (NHS and Dumfries and Galloway Council) which is available from the school.
