<p><u>Story Time</u> Listen to Oliver Jeffers read his story 'The Way Back Home'. Here is another version of the story for you to enjoy. If you have a physical copy, use it to read along.</p>	<p><u>Art and Craft</u> Have a go at making some puffy moon paint for some messy fun! The website says to use marbles to make the shapes in the paint, but experiment with different things you have to see what happens.</p>	<p><u>PE and Movement</u> Here's a selection of Aeroplane Games that you could adapt to play at home. Using the garden or going on a walk is always good too - keep moving!</p>	<p><u>Finding out Information</u> After writing about where you'd like to fly to (see box below), why not find out some more information about that place? This website has facts about lots of different countries. If you've made up an imaginary place, think up your own facts!</p>	<p><u>Tricky Words</u> This week's tricky words are 'no' and 'go'. Please ask an adult to write them on your word wall and then practise reading, writing and using them in conversation.</p>
<p><u>Wellbeing</u> At the end of the story, the boy receives a walkie-talkie to help talk to his new alien friend. Maybe you could phone a friend, send them a letter or an email - find a way to say hello to a friend you haven't talked to in a while.</p>	<p><u>Technology</u> Try making your own paper aeroplane. Ask someone else in your home to make one too and have a competition to see how far your plane can fly! Measure how far it has flown using objects. This video has follow-</p>	<p><u>Science</u> How far can a bottle fly? Try the Balloon Rocket experiment! This is a very fun science experiment using things you may have in your home. Click here for video instructions or click here</p>	<p><u>Independent Writing</u> In your jotter this week, have a think about where you would fly to in your own plane. Write about where you would go and what you'd do there. Would you take a friend? Draw a picture to go alongside your writing. Email us with your work - we'd love to see it!</p>	<p><u>Explore an Aeroplane</u> Have you been on a plane before? Use the Museum of Flight Virtual Tours to go inside different planes and see what they are like inside. Choose the type of plane and then scroll down to the 'Step Inside: 3d Tour' button. So cool!</p>
