How the School Works

Class Organisation

For organisational purposes, schools are structured into classes. Each year it is the responsibility of the Headteacher to organise the class structure.

One single register class. (Learning is delivered over two classrooms and a large outdoor space as well as weekly sessions at our partnership schools.)

Positive Behaviour and Celebrating Success

Positive classroom management is built around respect and consideration for others to help ensure the safety of staff, pupils and the environment in our school and across the partnership.

Where a pupil does not follow the expectations, the teacher will review the situation with the child to help them reflect on their actions and support positive next steps to help avoid further incidents which may impact on the safety of others. The school recognises the vital part to be played by full cooperation between parents/carers and school where any behavioural difficulties arise. In such cases an early referral to home will be made.

Weekly assemblies are held to celebrate pupil successes and recognise those who have demonstrated themselves to be successful learners, confidence individuals, responsible citizens and effective contributors. The Headteacher issues a certificate to pupils who demonstrate the school values and/or a UNCRC Right to others. Certificate winners are displayed on the Palnackie Star Wall and earn extra playtime.

Pupils have reviewed the points system and we now reward successes relating to

our values

Grants and Bursaries

Scottish Child Payment

The Scottish Child Payment is a payment for families on certain benefits or tax credits. Eligible families will get £40 every four weeks for each child under six.

Best Start Grant

Best Start Grant and Best Start Foods are payments that help towards the costs of being pregnant or looking after a child. Best Start Grant is made up of 3 one-off payments:

- Pregnancy and Baby Payment
- Early Learning Payment
- School Age Payment

Best Start Foods is a prepaid card that can be used in shops or online to buy healthy foods like milk or fruit. The payments you can get now will depend on:

- how far along in your pregnancy you are
- how old your child is

Clothing Grant

The award of clothing grants is to assist with the cost of school clothing for families who are on a qualifying benefit or on low income. The current award is presently £134 per primary school child and £150 per secondary school child.

School Meals

Special Dietary Requirements

Facilities Services – Catering provide special dietary requirements for food allergy and intolerances; medically prescribed diets; or diets for religious or cultural reasons specific meals for children of different ethnic origin. Free School Meals

Free school meals are provided for all pupils in Primary 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5. Confirmation of when this will be rolled out to Primary 6 and Primary 7 from the Scottish Government has yet to be confirmed.

In Nursery eligible children can receive up to 1140 hours a year of Early Learning and Childcare. As part of this funded offer the child will be entitled to one free meal and a snack each day.

All primary schools are now operating a pre-order system for school lunches for paid and free school meals. Parent / Carer will receive a letter informing them of how to create and set up an account for their child.

Free school meals can lead to a large saving in each year, nursery and primary school pupils can save £360 and secondary school pupils can save £370. You'll also be helping your child's school if you qualify for free school meals. Some Scottish Government funding provided directly to schools is linked to the number of pupils who are entitled to free school meals.

Attendance

It is your responsibility as parents to ensure that your child/children attend school regularly. For the safety of all children it is important for you to telephone the school office prior to/at the beginning of the absence. Absences are recorded in class registers and frequent or irregular absences not supported by a reasonable excuse, will be notified to parents and the matter may be referred to the Opportunities for All Service. If possible please, try to make dental/medical appointments outwith school hours. However, if this is not possible please inform us in writing or by telephone of the appointment and arrange to collect your child from class.

Absence from School

Pupils who need to leave school during the school day ie doctor /dentist appointments, must be collected by a named contact confirmed with the school office. They must also report to the school office on their return to school.

Curriculum for Excellence

Curriculum for Excellence (CfE), now known as 'Scotland's Curriculum,' is bringing learning to life in the way education is delivered for all 3-18 year olds in nursery, primary, secondary, at college and via workplace or community learning. It aims to respond and adapt flexibly to meet the needs of an ever changing and evolving world and Scotland's place within it. At its heart lies a constant commitment and drive towards excellence and equity, to raise standards, improve knowledge, develop skills for all learners and close the gap between the lowest and highest achievers by ensuring everyone has an equal opportunity to be successful no matter what their background or circumstances. Ultimately it aims to nurture children and young people as successful learners, confident individuals, effective contributors and responsible citizens.

Broad General Education

Children and young people work their way through Experiences and Outcomes in each of the five Curriculum Levels (Early, First, Second, Third, Fourth) and in each of the eight Curricular Areas. The five Curricular Levels span pre-school to the end of S3. This is the Broad General Education. Pupils progress at their own pace, working through the Experiences and Outcomes of the most appropriate level for them. Pupils will be supported in collecting evidence of their achievements, with a profile of these being produced in P7 and S3.

- Literacy includes reading, writing, listening and talking skills, within English and Scots. We are currently introducing Creating a Balanced Writer to help raise attainment in writing.
- Numeracy and Maths covers number skills and mathematical concepts such as measure and

- shape. We are using the Framework for Numeracy to build confidence and agility in the accurate recall of number knowledge.
- Religious and Moral Education develops pupils' spiritual, moral, social and cultural values through the teachings of Christianity, Other World Religions and personal and social development, delivered by the class teachers and our school chaplain.
- Inter-Disciplinary Learning helps learners make connections across different areas of learning. Our IDL topics include themes of the Vikings and Our Local Village.
- Expressive Arts (Art & Design, Dance, Drama and Music) are delivered both as unique topics and within IDL. We benefit from Scots music input by Feis Rois each year.
- STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) skills prepare learners for the jobs of tomorrow, encouraging them to generate, understand and analyse data.
- Health and Wellbeing input develops social, emotional and physical health. We refer to the Skills for Life programme to promote discussion of feelings and emotions. All children have an entitlement to two hours quality P.E. per week and we are supported by Active Schools and Cricket Scotland.
- Learning for Sustainability (LfS) helps us think about our role in society and the impact our actions have on each other and the environment.

- Identify issues you want the parent council to work on with the school
- Be asked your opinion by the parent council on issues relating to the school and education it provides
- Work in partnership with staff
- Enjoy taking part in school life in whatever way possible

How is my child doing?

There will be several opportunities for you to discuss your child's progress. This may be through informal discussion with the teacher or at Parents' Nights/ Learning Conversations, formal reports or for some it may be through more formal, focussed meetings with other agencies.



Helping Your Child and Family Learning

Reading and spelling/phonics are the focus of our regular homework tasks. Sumdog is an online literacy and numeracy program we use; the teacher sets activities for each child which can be completed at school and home so we encourage them to logon regularly to help reinforce skills taught within the classroom and allow you to watch their learning in action. From time to time, personal projects, research and presentations will be issued to complete at home to help learners demonstrate their ability to transfer their skills in new contexts.

Support from home is key to successful learning and the teacher will send home guidance, advice and helpful hints throughout the year and is also contactable through the school office or the homeschool diary.

Finding a quiet spot free from distraction and identifying a regular time to complete tasks at home will help you and your child learn together most effectively at home. Any other informal opportunities to talk, count and read together will help develop your child's core literacy, numeracy and wellbeing skills and we are most grateful for this.

Health and Safety

Emergency Procedures (including Safer Together Guidance)

If your child feels ill during the school day and we feel that he/she would be better at home, we will telephone you or your emergency contact. Minor accidents, e.g. cuts, bruises, are dealt with by the school staff. Serious accidents are few, but should one occur your child will be immediately taken either to your doctor or to hospital, if necessary, and you or your emergency contact will be notified. We cannot stress enough the importance of supplying the school with the relevant information we require in such a situation, i.e. your own home and work number and a telephone number of an emergency contact. Please remember that if your child stays in more than one home setting contact details should take account of this.

Health Care (inc First Aid)

Many children will require their health care needs to be met at sometime within the nursery/school environment, for most children this will be for short periods of time only, but for some children this may require more long-term planning and support. If your child has any health care needs, please contact the school to discuss arrangements. Full details of the support available and your role as a parent and the role of your child are contained within Health Care in Schools 3-18 (NHS and Dumfries and Galloway Council) which is available from the school.
