CLD practice contributes to a wide range of government priorities in areas including education, fairness and equalities, employability and community empowerment.

Before coming to Education Scotland, I was a Senior CLD Worker in Inverclyde Council with responsibility for adult literacies and ESOL. Laterally I undertook seconded posts within the Attainment Challenge CLD Families and Communities workstream, and PEF Funded Family Learning. I was the SQA Co-ordinator for Inverclyde CLD, while also working externally as a Systems Verifier for the SQA.
