

Reading for Pleasure

Eight <u>OU and UK Literacy Association Teachers'</u> <u>Reading Groups</u> are running for primary and secondary teachers in Scotland, from the Highlands to South Lanarkshire. Researchinformed, these free continued professional development groups are led by OU-trained volunteers and aim to nurture young people's reading for pleasure.

Professional Learning for primary school teachers

TEachers Learning to Teach languages (TELT)

- Aims to increase and improve language provision in primary schools, help to harmonise the standards of language and pedagogical skills across Scotland and beyond, and establish a community of practice of primary teachers teaching languages across Scotland and beyond.
- Teachers and their pupils have the chance to collaborate with peers in a different part of the UK through e-twinning.
- Delivered in partnership by The Open University and Scotland's National Centre for Languages (SCILT)
- Accredited as a Professional Recognition Programme by the General Teaching Council for Scotland.
- > Open to all primary teachers and secondary teachers on secondment in primary.
- > Study can be self-funded or employer-sponsored.
- Four languages available; French, German, Spanish and Mandarin Chinese.



Primary opportunities

Languages Explorer Programme

A collaborative project with the University of Aberdeen, Aberdeenshire Council, SCILT and Aberdeenshire primary and secondary schools.

6 week languages mentoring programme – Aberdeen University languages students acting as mentors for selected S2 pupils.

Outcome of pupils continuing their language study into senior phase and beyond school.

In the longer term, there will be a volunteering opportunity for OU students to take part too.

Aim – to enhance awareness of languages and cultures, showing the role of languages in the world of work, and the skills learners develop alongside linguistic knowledge.

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Opportunities for Young People

Young Applicants in Schools Scheme (YASS)


Designed to bridge the gap between school and university, college or employment.

Encourages independent learning and builds confidence in key study skills like time management and using a virtual learning environment.

YASS students study one level 1 (SCQF level 7) OU module. Subjects include Law, Maths, Social Sciences, Languages and Engineering plus more.

Registration for YASS is organised through the school, with students treated as usual OU students when it comes to work for their course and assessment.

Students earn credits for the module studied but these can't be used as part of a UCAS tariff. However, YASS results are tracked as part of Insight.

Engagement with secondary schools

Mock COP27

Event held in November 2022 in Inverness with 11 secondary schools from across the Highlands and Moray.

Working in partnership with Developing the Young Workforce Inverness and Central Highlands and Highland One World, the OU in Scotland held the daylong set of mock negotiations with around 70 young people representing 11 countries, special interest groups or businesses in negotiations on climate change issues such as agriculture, funding for adaptation, the use of coal and zero emission vehicles.

Event was joined by a youth ambassador from COP27 itself in Egypt via video call and an OU academic in Environmental Studies gave his impressions of the importance of the issues raised at the Mock COP.

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Subject specific pedagogy

Additional subject registration – Physics and Chemistry

- For anyone interested in adding an additional subject to their registration or looking to train as a teacher, our certificates in Physics and Chemistry could be a good option to help gain the academic requirements needed in these subjects.
- The Professional Certificate in Chemistry enhances knowledge of the main branches of chemistry and builds investigative and practical skills.
- The Certificate in Physics provides a wide-ranging introduction to physics and its applications, as well as introducing experimental physics. The certificate in endorsed by the Institute of Physics.
- Both certificates involve studying 90 credits at SCQF level 8 in the form of a 60 credit module and a 30 credit module.
- We would advise checking with GTCS guidance to make sure that either certificate will meet the requirements needed for intended career routes.



Opportunities for secondary schools

Cisco Networking Academy – supporting delivery of Computing in schools

- Pilot programme offering schools chance to join the Cisco Networking Academy programme (NetAcad).
- Teachers can train as Cisco instructors and access learning materials that support the curriculum for the National Progression Awards (NPAs) in Computer Networking and Cyber Security.
- Learning materials on NetAcad have been directly mapped alongside NPAs to ensure maximal suitability. OU staff are on hand to support teachers as they learn through NetAcad and support their pupils to use materials.
- The Open University Cisco Academy Support Centre (ASC) and Instructor Training Centre (ITC) is currently one of the biggest ASCs and ITCs in the UK.
- Open collaboration with others to support community of 300+ educational organisations, offering resources, support and professional development.

Report: Professional online learning in Scottish education

This Open University project is exploring experiences and perceptions of online professional learning among education practitioners across Scotland to support their development and career goals.

More than 180 practitioners from across early learning and childcare to the colleges sector were surveyed online.
