

In 2022-23, the Curriculum Outdoors Attainment Challenge (COACh) team consisted of 2 FTE posts – I principal teacher and 2 part-time teachers. All COACh input is designed to build teacher capacity to lead outdoor learning.

Team Teaching Sessions

The sessions are planned and led by COACh staff with an increasing amount of input from school staff as a sequence of sessions progress. Session focus is agreed in advance to meet the needs of both staff and pupils. The targeted focus can be from a single curricular area or from interdisciplinary learning to support work towards Wider Achievement awards (the RSPB Schools Wild Challenge, Heritage Hero Awards or the John Muir Award). School staff are supplied in advance with a planning overview and possible follow up work. The overview includes links to resources available online from the EAC LOST blog pages or other appropriate sources.

SWEIC Outdoor Learning CLPL 2022-23

COACh are members of the SWEIC network organising and facilitating 6 Outdoor Learning CLPL sessions across all 4 SWEIC authorities. Each session was based a theme from the Education Scotland Thematic Inspection of Outdoor Learning, *Successful Approaches to Outdoor Learning*. The format for each session consisted of a keynote speaker and presentations from schools presenting their own examples of good practice. COACh ensured that an EAC establishment presented at each CLPL session so that EAC good practice has been widely shared. COACh and EAC LOST materials remain a core part of the outdoor learning resources collated by SWEIC and shared on Teams.

EAC LOST Camp Outs

Camp outs are being used by schools in East Ayrshire to promote parental engagement and to provide a transition experience for P6 pupils who will go on a residential trip in P7. Camp outs can also be used as an alternative to (potentially) costly residential visits. Bell tents to accommodate pupils, families and staff are provided by COACh and COACh staff assist by providing all necessary camping equipment, setting up and taking down a camp, support with planning and, if requested, support running and supervising activities.

Number of Establishments receiving COACh equipment as part of the dispersal: 1 Secondary, 7 Primary Schools, 3 ECC/EA TAP Team, 2 Special Schools and the Homelink Team.

In addition, 20 Primary and ECC practitioner 'grab bags' were created and given out to individuals attending training or PLN sessions. These kits included ID keys, mini treasure chests and activity cards. In addition dining shelters were provided to one ECC and one secondary school. A COACh box was created for Dunlop PS.



Schools Outdoor Learning Audit and Self Evaluation

COACh created an audit and self evaluation toolkit based on HGIOS 4, the Education Scotland LfS Self Evaluation toolkit and the Learning through Landscapes outdoor learning audit tools. The resulting toolkit provides a comprehensive set of challenge questions and examples of practice allowing teams to establish their current strengths and areas for development.

The toolkit was piloted at Onthank PS as part of a COACh whole school collegiate session and working party follow up with COACh support. Since then a small working party at James Hamilton PS has used the toolkit independently.

Both Onthank and James Hamilton Primary Schools have identified next steps, including them in their planning for 2023-24. COACh will be providing further targeted support at both schools in the coming session.

EAC LOST Monthly Newsletter and EAC LOST Blog

In 2022-23, COACh produced the term time, monthly EAC LOST newsletters which went out to approximately 900 subscribers across Scotland and the UK.

The newsletter shares outdoor learning news and inspiration. Learning and teaching suggestions were shared as links to the EAC LOST blog pages; EAC, SWEIC and national training and resources were signposted; and EAC establishments shared their own outdoor learning successes in a very popular *School Shoutouts!* Section.

The EAC LOST blog is used to shared COACh and EAC Learning Outdoors Support Team teaching and learning resources (lesson plans, activity suggestions, IDL topic planning) mapped to Curriculum for Excellence. It is used to signpost useful websites and partner organisations. The blog is accessed by educators in EAC, Scotland, the UK, Canada, US and Australia in particular with other users in mainland Europe and in Asia.

By the end of June, 2023, the EAC LOST blog pages had been accessed a total of 236, 736 times.
