Brush	"Not by the hair on my chinny chin chin!" said the pig. Brush their chin as you say the line.
Action	So the wolf huffed and he puffed and he blew the house down. Blow on their cheek.
Tongs	And he gobbled up the first little pig. Repeatedly grab appropriate parts of their body (arm, nose, ear, leg etc.) with the tongs.
Sticks	The second little pig built his house out of sticks. They feel the sticks.
Board/table	One day the wolf came to the pig's house and knocked on the door. "Little pig! Little pig! Please let me in!" Knock on board/table.
Brush	"Not by the hair on my chinny chin chin!" said the pig. Brush their chin as you say the line.
Action	So the wolf huffed and he puffed and he blew the house down. Blow on their cheek.
Tongs	And he gobbled up the second little pig. Repeatedly grab appropriate parts of their body (arm, nose, ear, leg etc.)
Brick	with the tongs. The third little pig built his house out of bricks. They feel the bricks/stones.

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Board/table	One day a hungry wolf came to the pig's house and knocked on the door. "Little pig! Little pig! Please let me in!" <i>Knock on board/table.</i>
Brush	" Not by the hair on my chinny chin chin!" said the pig. Brush their chin as you say the line.
Action	So the wolf huffed and he puffed And he huffed and he puffed And he huffed and he puffed Blow on their cheek between each phrase. But he couldn't blow the brick house down. So he decided to climb down the chimney.
Charcoal	But this little pig was very clever. He lit the fire under the chimney. Feel and smell the charcoal.
Saucepan of water	And when the wolf came through, he fell into a big pot of boiling water. They splash their hand in the water.
Saucepan and lid	The little pig put the lid on. They put the lid on the pan. And that was the end of the big, bad wolf.

Items needed for this story

Pigs – Strip of 3 sections of egg box.

Straw(s) – Hay-type straw would be perfect, but if not, a handful of drinking straws would also work.

Board table – Any hard surface that you can knock on.

Brush – Some sort of soft-bristled brush such as a paint or pastry brush.

Tongs – Kitchen tongs. Avoid any with sharper or pointy bits as these may hurt.

Sticks – A collection of any sort of sticks. These could be twigs from a tree, ice lolly sticks, or even cocktail sticks.

Brick/stones – An actual brick is ideal. If using stones make sure they are too big to swallow.
