Make Symmetrical Pictures

Make moth (not butterfly!) symmetrical pictures. The following link should provide some inspiration. Moths try to hide during the day (camouflage) so colours need to blend in with the trees and bushes they rest on.

Make Timetable

Make a timetable showing what you do on a school day/weekend . Make one for Plop's day. . What is the same? What is different?

Litter Maths – see Litter Pick in RME

Sorting for recycling – plastics, metals, paper and items that can't be recycled. Measure – heaviest/lightest bag of litter, longest/shortest piece of litter Bar Chart – set out the sorted litter on the ground in bar chart format (use rope or sticks for axes) and pupils answer questions, "How many....?" "Which sort of litter did we find most often?" ... Can pupils set questions?

Rope Trail Activity

Plop was helped by lots of different characters in the story. This activity gives pupils practical experience of putting ourselves in someone else's place and giving advice. A rope trail can be set up almost anywhere. Once the trail (rope strung at pupil hand height) has been set up, pupils take turns to lead or be lead (blindfold) along the trail. The blindfolded pupil holds the rope and uses this as a guide. The trail goes up, down, under and through obstacles. The pupil that is guiding needs to give clear accurate instructions to their partner. When the activity has been completed, the children swap roles and complete the task in reverse. The emphasis is on co-operation and taking care of your partner. Literacy and English

Retell the Story and Sequence

Allocate each pupil (or a small group) a part of the story to illustrate. Create a washing line display with class asked to to put the story in order - no more than 3 pupil illustrations to start and add more as pupils become more confident. Decide (with the class) how to divide up the story. There are 7 chapters but you made decide to group chapters or break a chapter into parts.

Collect Textures

Go on a texture hunt and collect textures using soft clay to capture imprints of different textures found in your outdoor space. Display with scribed descriptions. Or take some wax crayon rubbings. www.opalexplorenature.org/sites/default/files/7/file/BarkArt.pdf B

Use Adjectives

Plop is described as fat, fluffy, soft and perfect. Describe another night time creature (hedgehog?).

Pupils Risk Assess and Plan

Before your campfire session, ask the children how we are going to keep ourselves safe around the fire. Adult scribes and uses key words as prompt on the day.

Expressive Arts
