from God and as a sign of hope and better things to come. Activity Listen to the Story of Noah's Ark – Make a Your Own Rainbow	Assessment
 Pupils listen to the story of Noah and the importance of the rainbow at the end of the story is highlighted. The rainbow was sent as a sign from God that there will never be another flood. Pupils are shown that we can create rainbows of our own – sit a glass of water on a table edge so that the sun/torch shines through the water; place sheet of white paper on the ground so that the rainbow colours fall on to the paper; paint matching colours on top of the colours cast; extend each mark of colour into a rainbow arc. Teacher to ask each pupil in turn, 'What was special about the rainbow in the story of Noah's Ark? Teacher scribes pupil responses. Make a washing line display of the rainbow art. 	Teacher assessment of pupil responses to the question, 'What was special about the rainbow in the story of Noah's Ark?'
