



Outdoor Learning Contexts for Writing - Four Writing Styles and 9 Text Types

The Active Literacy Team in EA have produced an overview grid to ensure coverage across all writing styles. EAC LOST have filled the grid with suggestions for writing contexts which make use of the opportunities afforded by outdoor learning pedagogy. Outdoor settings provide space, stimulation for all the senses, direct engagement with real world issues, opportunities to make noise, experiment and work in large groups or individually. In outdoor settings, learners can engage with both the man made and natural worlds. Use the hyperlinks to find supporting resources for suggested activities. The final page of this document has further information on how outdoor learning is used to increase engagement and raise attainment.

The suggestions below are stimuli and contexts for writing. The Active Literacy Team have created comprehensive resources to support teaching and learning in Literacy and English – including SAC COW (Creating Outstanding Writing). These can be found on Glow and MS Teams.


