THE HISTORY OF HALLOWEEN

Taking place between autumn and winter, Halloween creates time for celebration and superstition. Although the exact origin is unknown, it is believed the holiday derived from the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain, which took place in Ireland. Where people would light bonfires and wear costumes to ward off roaming ghosts and other supernatural spirits. In the eighth century, Pope Gregory III designated November 1 as a time to honour all saints and martyrs; creating the holiday, All Saints' Day. The evening before was known as All Hallows' Eve and later Halloween.

Halloween, one of the world's oldest holidays, is still celebrated today in a number of countries around the world. However, Halloween isn't celebrated in the same way across the globe. In Mexico and other Latin American countries, Día de los Muertos—the Day of the Dead—honours deceased loved ones and ancestors. The Haunting of Jessop Rise by Danny Weston



Halloween Soup

Ingredients

4Tbsp Olive oil- Probably the most widely-used oil in cooking, olive oil is pressed from fresh olives. It's...

2 Onions finely chopped- Onions are endlessly versatile and an essential ingredient in countless recipes. Native to Asia...

1 Kg Pumpkin-Pumpkins are the most famous of all the winter squashes, and are most associated with Halloween...or squash (try kabocha), peeled, deseeded and chopped into chunks

700ml vegetable stock or chicken stock]

142ml pot double cream

4 slices whole meal seeded bread

Handful pumpkin seed from a packet

Method

1. Heat **2 tbsp. olive oil** in a large saucepan, then gently cook **2 finely chopped onions** for 5 mins, until soft but not coloured. Add **1kg peeled, deseeded and chopped pumpkin or squash** to the pan, then carry on cooking for 8-10 mins, stirring occasionally until it starts to soften and turn golden.

2. Pour **700ml vegetable stock** into the pan, then season with salt and pepper. Bring to the boil, and then simmer for 10 mins until the squash is very soft. Pour the **142ml pot of double cream into the pan**; bring back to the boil, then purée with a hand blender. For an extra-velvety consistency you can now push the soup through a fine sieve into another pan. The soup can now be frozen for up to 2 months.

3. While the soup is cooking, slice the crusts from **4 slices of whole meal seed bread**, then cut the bread into small croutons. Heat the remaining **2 tbsp. olive oil** in a frying pan, and then fry the bread until it starts to become crisp. Add **a handful of pumpkin seeds** to the pan, and then cook for a few mins more until

they are toasted. These can be made a day ahead and stored in an airtight container. Reheat the soup if needed, taste for seasoning, then serve scattered with croutons and seeds and drizzled with more olive oil, if you want.

Halloween Cake

Ingredients

Cake

50g of SR Flour
50g of Soft Margarine
50g of Caster Sugar
1 Egg
1ml of Baking Powder

Decoration

Glace Icing
50g of Icing Sugar
Water
Colouring

Method

1. Preheat oven to 180 degrees Celsius, No4 Line cake tin.
2. Place margarine, sugar and sieved flour into a bowl.
3. Add beaten egg. Beat till light and fluffy.
4. Spoon cake mixture into tin bake till springy to touch.
5. Remove from oven and cool on cool wire.

Decoration

1. Make up glace icing adding a little water at a time to make a syrupy consistency.
2. Add a few drops of colouring.
3. Pour on centre of cake, spread evenly.
4. Using a separate piping bag with chocolate glace icing pipe a swirl on cake starting from the middle and working out to edge.
5. Draw a skewer from the centre out towards the edge to create a web pattern.
