



Read stories in a cosy corner, in the garden, on the sofa, or anywhere!!



Writing—Write a story about the picture. Why is the policeman on the roof? What adventure might the boy and girl go on? What might the horse do after eating the flower?



Reading - Explore some new books on Oxford Owl. Look for the login on the main P1 Blog page.



Playdough words— Use your playdough to make some oa, ai and oy words.



Alphabet Scavenger hunt—Find something in the house or garden that begins with each letter of the alphabet!

Sound spy—Pick a phoneme and see how many words you can spot in a book or magazine that has that phoneme. E.g. I spy a word with the sound 'sh'. I spy a word with the sound 'u'.



Reading - Read a book on Bug Club and **remember to answer the bugs.**

Writing—The nursery children have just found out their new teacher for Primary 1. Can you write them a short note or letter telling them about your favourite part of P1? Maybe a favourite activity we do, a topic you have enjoyed or what happens in school e.g. playtime/lunch!



Writing—Practice some of the common words using some of these fun ideas attached.



Writing—Draw a picture of your bedroom, garden or favourite place in your house. Label the different things that are in that space.



Talking and Listening— Describing pictures. Play this fun game with a partner or your whole family! Who can draw your picture the best?

Rainbow Words

First, write your spelling words in pencil. Trace over the words 5 times using a different coloured crayon each time.



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Bubble Words

Write your spelling words in bubble letters. After you have written them, you can colour them in with crayons.



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Headlines

Cut letters out of newspapers and magazines to spell out your words. Stick them down to a piece of paper.



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Spelling Shapes

Count your spelling words. Draw one shape for each word. Now, write a spelling word in each of the shapes.

Example:



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Air Write

Write your spelling words in the air with your finger. Ask someone to read your words as you write. You could also ask someone to air write while you read the word!



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Magnetic Letters

Use your magnetic letters to write your spelling words.



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Fancy Letters

Write out each of your spelling words using fancy writing. Your letters could be curly or dotted.



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Curly Words

Firstly, write your spelling words out in normal letters. Then, write them again in curly letters!



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Explore the digraph 'oy' (as in boy, toy, ahoy) on Big Club. Have a go at some of the activities in the lesson.
