When you walk into Sorn Primary School you will;


- See smiles and hear laughter happiness is our number one priority!




Absence & Lateness


If your child is absent from school please notify us before **9.15am**. Should your child need to leave school at any time, please inform the school as soon as possible and arrange for them to be collected from the school office.


Should you take your child out of school for a family holiday, this absence will be marked as **unauthorised**.


Having problems getting your child to school?

We operate an open door policy and welcome the opportunity to discuss your child/ren's progress or supports they may need at any time.


You can arrange a meeting or phone call with any member of staff through the School Office. You can also email the school direct should you require any information or wish to discuss a matter.



PE Kit can be stored in school in a gym bag. No other stationery or supplies for the classroom are necessary.


ParentPay


School lunches are ordered via ParentPay. Visit the ParentPay website to register and create an account for your child/ren.


ParentPay is also used to pay funds towards School Fund. These can include payments for trips or outings, non-uniform days, etc.

Once logged into ParentPay select "Book meals and places"

The Scottish curriculum is currently undergoing a review process and information around this improvement cycle will be shared with you as parents and carers as it is released.

This information leaflet is based on our current curriculum structure.

The curricular areas are broken down into Experiences & Outcomes, sometimes called Es & Os. These describe the expectations for learning and progression.

The **Benchmarks** are a set of statements which are used to assess learning. Such as;

Experience & Outcome

MNU 2-01a

"I can use my knowledge of rounding to routinely estimate the answer to a problem then, after calculating, decide if my answer is reasonable, sharing my solution with others"

Benchmark

Rounds whole numbers to the nearest 1000, 10,000 and 100,000.

Rounds decimal fractions to the nearest whole number, to one decimal place and two decimal places.

Applies knowledge of rounding to give an estimate to a calculation appropriate to the context.

Sorn Primary Curriculum

At Sorn we have our own unique context and staff have worked to develop a curriculum offer which reflects this.

Numeracy & Mathematics, Literacy & English and Health & Wellbeing, as well as some aspects of digital technologies and Expressive Arts, are taught throughout the school year.

To enable immersion and depth of learning in other areas we have a concentrated focus at different times of the year;

Term 1 (Aug – Dec)	Term 2 (Jan – Apr)	Term 3 (Apr – Jun)
Social Studies & Expressive Arts	Science & Technologies	Modern Foreign Languages & RME

We currently have a three year rolling programme in place for each subject area however this will be changing to a two year rolling programme as of August 2025.

Every year we deliver a Curriculum Information Evening where you can see exactly how our curriculum is planned and delivered.

Our School Improvement Plan 2025-2026

How is a School Improvement Plan devised?

- Using self- evaluation evidence for pupils, parents & staff.
- Reflecting the priorities in the East Ayrshire Education Service Improvement Plan
- Considering local, National & International research, reports and trends in education

During May/June a Standards & Quality Report is compiled by the Head Teacher to evaluate how effectively the previous year's improvement priorities have been completed.

The Standards and Quality Report may also inform the following year's School Improvement Plan if something wasn't actioned or only partially completed.



The School Improvement Plan is a working document meaning, it is used and reviewed throughout the school year to ensure developments are still relevant and on track.

What does self-evaluation look like in Sorn Primary School?

To structure our self-evaluation we use a document, produced by Education Scotland called:

- 'How Good is Our School? Also known as 'HGIOS'.
- This document contains a set of 'Quality Indicators' (QIs) and examples of ways in which we can assess how well we are doing in each area.
- This is what we use as a basis for all of our self-evaluation activities including our parental questionnaires, our pupil discussions and our staff evaluation sessions.
- Staff and pupils also rate each of the QIs for our School

What is on the plan for year 2025/26?

- All children will be provided with opportunities to develop the four capacities through planned learning experiences.

Reporting to Parents & Carers

'Parents and families must have access to information that allows them to form a clear understanding of how their child is progressing, and the information they need to help them play a key role in their child's education'

National Improvement Framework

When we think about reporting to parents/carers, we tend to only consider written reports and parent teacher consultations. However, we actually use numerous different methods to communicate with, and engage, parents and carers in their children's learning.

At Sorn Primary School we have seen that engagement with our children's families directly impacts their attainment and achievement.

Because of this, we have developed different methods to help support our pupils and our families through quality communication.

Engagement must be... Regular, Meaningful, Purposeful & Ongoing

What does engagement look like at Sorn Primary School?

- Parent consultation evenings, twice a year,
- Written interim reports which include progress against national standard levels
- Scheduled newsletters highlighting the learning opportunities the children have experienced and their achievements in and outside of school.
- Curriculum Evenings to allow parents to see how and why we teach different elements of the curriculum
- Child's Plans for children accessing support.
- Parent/Carer self-evaluation & feedback questionnaires
- Team with the Family (TWF) meetings,
- Events including productions, ceilidhs, fayres etc.
- Class blogs created by the children
- Homework grids and curriculum overviews
- Parent Council Meetings
- Teaching Staff are available at the school gate at the start and end of the day for informal feedback.

Tracking, Monitoring & Assessment Guide for Parents

What is assessment in education?

- Assessment is carried out to establish what children know, understand and are able to do.
- Assessment information is used to track children's progress, plan next steps and report to parents.
- Evidence is gathered in different ways to ascertain progress and attainment

Each curriculum area is broken down into 'Experiences' and 'Outcomes' often referred to as Es & Os.


Experiences describes the learning and Outcomes refer to what the learning will achieve, often in the form of 'I can...' statements e.g. I can recognise the difference between fact and opinion.

Each of the Es & Os has associated 'Benchmarks' which support practitioners to make a professional judgement on the children's learning and assign levels to their attainment.

For example; 'Rounds a whole number to the nearest 10, 100 and 1000.

In Scotland the following levels are used to describe a pupil's attainment and progress;

- -Early Level (Age 3- P1)
- -First Level (P2-P4)
- -Second Level (P5-P7)
- -Third/Fourth Level (\$1-\$3)
- -Senior Phase (\$4-\$6)



The Scottish National Standardised Assessments (SNSA) are undertaken online by children in P1, P4 and P7.

These are standardised assessments in literacy and numeracy and help to provide diagnostic information to support teacher judgements.

How do we assess our children at Sorn Primary School?

Our teachers use a number of different methods to asses our children's progress including observations, questioning, marking work, tests and assessments.

These can occur as part of the daily learning, from time to time (periodically) in line with the Tracking and Monitoring Calendar and at key transition points.

We also use:

- Pupil self-assessment
- Peer assessment
- Direct teacher assessment

To support judgements on progress and attainment.

What is Tracking & Monitoring?

Tracking & Monitoring Meetings are held four times across the school year between the Head Teacher and the class teacher. This is when the portfolio of evidence for a child is discussed and the level at which they are deemed to be working is recorded on the Tracking & Monitoring Database.

During this meeting next steps are discussed for each child and any intervention or support that they may require is established. Targets for attainment are set in September and are reviewed throughout the school year.

The data is analysed at each of these meetings for individual pupils, cohorts of pupils and at a whole school level. This data is uplifted by East Ayrshire Council Education Department three times a year.

The attainment data is discussed at authority level in September.

Moderation events between Education Group schools and comparator schools are used to ensure there is consistency in teacher judgements across the authority and the country.
