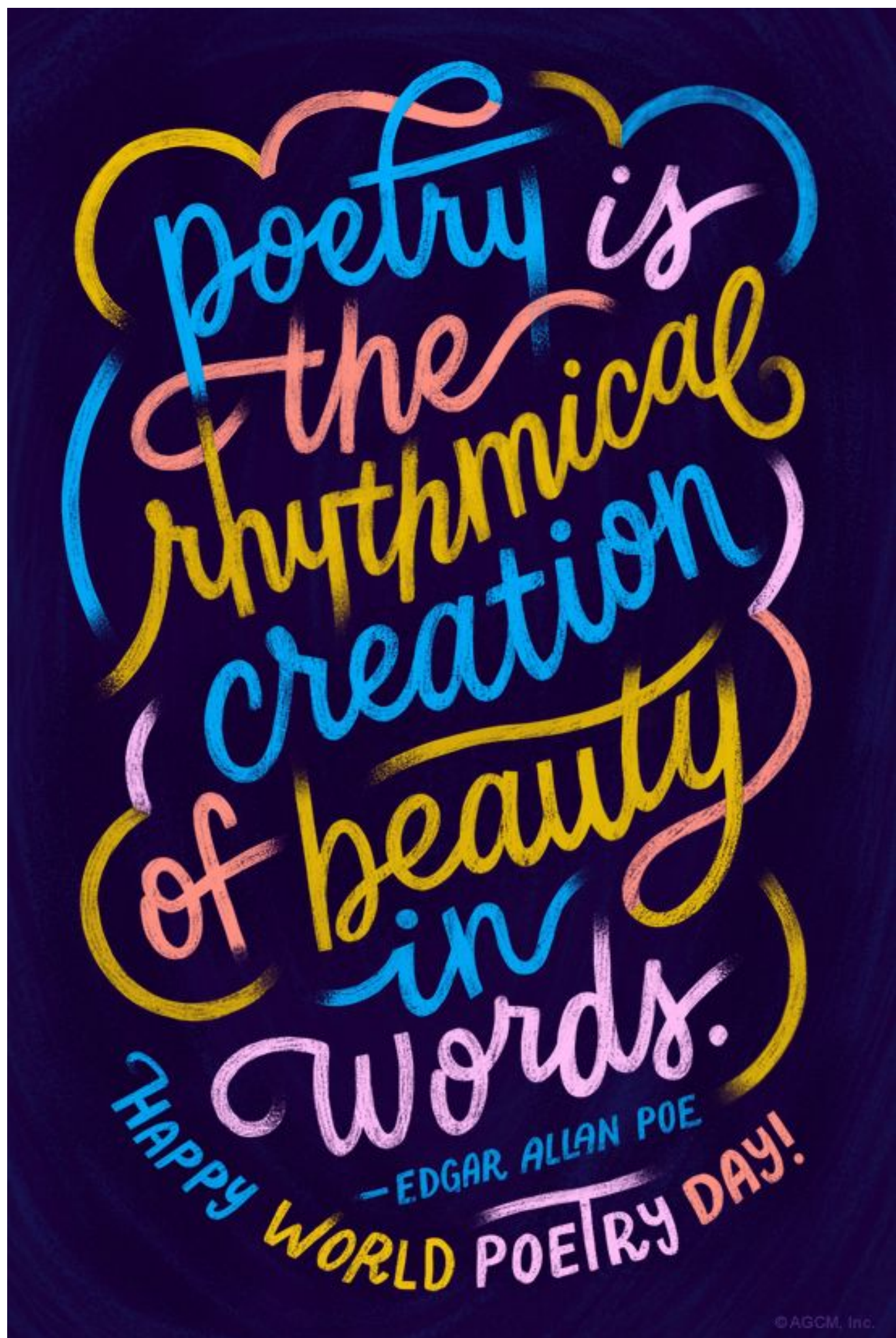


The library has a whole selection of books in our brand new Building Racial Literacy section. Pick something up from here to learn about different people and different cultures!
