Literacy Starters

A spicy selection of literacy-focused starters to whet your appetite!

Tweet and Sour

Write a tweet (no more than 140 characters) inked to the book you are currently reading in class.

Word Ton Soup

Chose an unusual word and write three different sentences, each including the word.

Mini Spring Rules

Choose a type of punctuation and create a poster that clearly explains the rules for how it should be used.

Mixed Sentence Platter

Write a short descriptive paragraph about the setting (place) you are currently in. You should aim to include as many adjectives and adverbs as you can.

Speech Cocktail

Pick two famous people of your choosing and write a short dialogue that you imagine they might have if they were ever to meet.

Spicy Baked Book.....

Write a one page review on the book you have most recently read

Yu Teach Tu

Choose a literacy skill you have learned about and try to explain it to someone else.

Aromatic Audit.....

Select a piece of writing you have done for another subject (anything at all) and audit your own literacy skills.

Ask a family member to carry out a short piece of writing. When they have finished, mark it for them in the style of your English teacher. Don't forget to give them 2 ticks and a fix!


Creative Crumble
