Looking to the Future

In October 2016, the Earl of Strathearn officially launched the redevelopment of The Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders Museum.

This follows a successful HLF Stage 1 application and support from a range of funders including Museums and Galleries Scotland. During the visit The Earl was given a tour of the current exhibition and met pupils from Queen Victoria School Dunblane and Allan's Primary School, Stirling.

Work is now under way to develop our education programme and replace the current galleries with contemporary displays thereby ensuring the future of the Museum.

Our objects are an educational tool which encourages ideas and experiences, and it is through the collection that the Museum will tell the story of the soldiers who fought with the Regiment and their families.

As part of the redevelopment the Museum has embarked on a digitisation programme to

photograph every object in the storerooms and on display, starting with paintings and prints.

The work includes recording every detail, identifying any conservation issues and providing comprehensive photographic images.

In addition, the interpretation collection will be expanded and

made available either in a new education room or as part of Outreach.

In conjunction with an upgrade to the building, the collection will provide an enhanced learning environment for visitors, schools and community groups from home and overseas.

Visit/Outreach: Handling Boxes

We offer primary, secondary and community groups the chance to borrow a handling box.

The boxes can be booked as part of a visit to the Museum, for a session in the classroom or for an event.

They contain a mixture of original and replica objects, documents and

photographs from our collection and external sources.

You will have the opportunity to handle original Service Dress Jackets from the World Wars, a doublet from 1901, embroidered postcards, try on replica gas masks and use a gas attack rattle.

Activity sheets with information on each of the objects are included in the boxes.

General Visits, Guides and Talks

You can book a free teacher-led or guide-led general visit.

We have a range of support materials to help your group learn about the Regiment, Scottish and World history from 1794 to the present day.

See Surgeon Munro's surgical instruments c 1850s, find out what happened to the World War I soldier who was sentenced to be shot for falling asleep at his post,



explore the handwritten letters by Prisoners of War and look at the uniform worn by Captain Archibald in Afghanistan.

An experienced Guide (please pre-book) is available for any of your visits to the Museum and outreach events.

Museum Visit: World War II/Home Front



Similar to our World War I learning resource, we offer a World War II visit.

Learn about the real-life stories of fighting soldiers, Prisoners of War and the people they left behind.

Find out who the 'Three Musketeers of Ballachulish' were, examine a Vickers Machine Gun scene and learn about sticky grenades.

The visit can be teacher-led or guide-led and all come with activity sheets to help your students explore the collection and the experiences of Scottish soldiers during the War.

Booking Information

All visits must be booked at least 14 days in advance.

Please include the following information when you contact the Museum:

- The preferred dates and times for your visit
- The name, address and contact details of your school or organisation
- The name and contact details of the group leader
- The number and age range of the group
- The number of supervisory adults who will be in attendance (ratio 1 adult: 10 children)
- The reason for your

visit/topic of study

- Details of any additional support needs your group or any member of your group might have and the help they might need on the day

- If you would like to book a free planning visit

- Whether you require a space in our lunch area.

Shop

There is a shop in the Museum; please ensure that there is a ratio of 1 adult to 10 when in the shop.

About the Museum...

The Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders Museum is located in Stirling Castle.

The Museum traces the history of the 91st Argyllshire Highlanders and the 93rd Sutherland Highlanders up to the time of their amalgamation in 1881 when they became the 1st and 2nd Battalions of The Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders Regiment and thereafter to the present day.

Stirling Castle has been the home of The Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders (Princess Louise's) since 1881 and through the years, many objects of regimental interest have been handed in, including: paintings, medals, silver, uniform and documents.

However, it was not until 1988 that a museum was opened in the King's Old Building of the Castle to display these objects; and,

perhaps more importantly, to relate the illustrious history of the Regiment and the many personal stories of the officers, soldiers and their families.

The Museum receives modest Ministry of Defence funding, but is almost entirely maintained through public donations. The Museum is governed by a charitable trust: The Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders Museum Trust.

Toilets

The toilets are situated at the entrance and exit of the Museum.

Parking

The drop-off and collection area is on the Castle Esplanade.

Access

There are a number of stairs in the Museum which may cause problems for those with limited mobility.
