ALPINO'S AWARDS




The Alpino is a chippy located on Cross Arthurlie Street that is family owned.

A DIVE INTO HOW SLAVERY AND COLONIALISM SHAPED GLASGOW'S **HISTORY**

GLASGOW: THE SECOND CITY OF THE EMPIRE?




During the 18th and 19th century, one of history's most widespread atrocities occurred. The Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade. Over 10 million African people were kidnapped and sent to the Caribbean and Latin America, where they were forced to work in torturous conditions. Many died from vile diseases or from punishments they recieved from colonialists. This tragic string of events, and Scotland's role in them, is taught in our schools now, but many adults never recieved this education and don't know how impactful Glasgow was.

Kelvingrove Art Gallery and Museum opened a new exhibit at the start of November entitled "Glasgow: City of Empire". This is after previous calls for a dedicated slavery museum in Scotland. Located on the South Balcony of the museum, this permanent exhibition covers how Glasgow was far more important in the Slave Trade than we thought, and how racism links into modern Scotland.

During the rule of the British Empire, we enslaved, tortured and killed millions from many countries around the world, prominently West Africa and India (now India, Pakistan and Bangladesh). Many of the iconic buildings in Glasgow centre were commissioned by slave owners such as Andrew Buchanan, William Cunninghame and James Dunlop, or even built by slaves themselves, most famous of which is the Gallery of Modern Art on Queen St. 62 of our streets are named after words related to the slave trade, or modern racism, such as Jamaica St, Buchanan St, or Glassford St. According to a report written last year by Glasgow City Council, Scotland's role in slavery was so prominent that "the blood of trafficked and enslaved African people is built into the very bones of this city".

This exhibit is incredibly important in understanding our responsibilities and is definitely something that most if not all of us should have a look at. It certainly deepened my understanding of our history, and allowed me to think differently about the city that we live so near to.



STUDENT INTERVIEW



SCHOOL CAPTAIN: NABIL







This month, we had the opportunity to interview one of the school captains, Nabil. As a disclaimer, on the day of the interview, Nabil brought along one of the depute school captains, Soroush. This was meant to be a one-on-one interview but most of the answers came from both of them.

Apple Strudel

Ingredients

- 750g Bramley apples, peeled, cored, quartered and sliced
- 1 1/2 tsp cinnamon
- 1/2 lemon worth of zest
- 2 tsp lemon juice
- 100g golden caster sugar
- 75g raisins (optional)
- 95g butter
- 40g white breadcrumbs
- 6 large sheets filo pastry
- 1 tbsp icing sugar

Instructions

- Preheat the oven to 190C/170C Fan/Gas 5. Line a baking tray with baking parchment.
- Mix the apples with the cinnamon, lemon zest and juice, sugar and raisins. In a small frying pan, melt 20g/¾oz butter and fry the breadcrumbs until golden-brown, then add to the apple mixture.
- Melt the remaining butter in a pan. On a clean, dry tea-towel lay a sheet of the filo and brush with some of the melted butter. Lay another sheet on top and repeat until you have used all of the filo.
- Pile the filling along the length of the pastry along one side about 2-3 cm/1in from the edge and using the tea-towel to help you, roll the pastry up to enclose the filling. Tuck the ends in and roll seam-side down onto the lined baking sheet. Brush with the remaining melted butter.
- Bake for 40-45 minutes, until golden-brown. Leave to cool to room temperature and dust with icing sugar. Slice and serve with cream, ice cream or custard.

LAYERING FOR WINTER

Winter is insanely cold in Scotland, and its important that we wrap up properly to avoid getting ill, or just being uncomfortable. But sometimes, outfits just feel or look to bulky for your taste, so here's a guide to layering:

If you want to keep warm, remember the 3 layer rule. A base layer that wicks off sweat, an insulating layer that retains body heat, and a shell layer to protect you from the elements. An example of a base layer is something like thermals, or a tighter fitting part of your outfit. The insulating layer has to do what it says, keep you warm. Consider fleeces, jumpers or hoodies for this.

Finally, the shell layer is simply a waterproof jacket or bodywarmer to protect you from the harsh elements.

You can also incorporate scarves, hats, gloves or earmuffs, if necessary.







