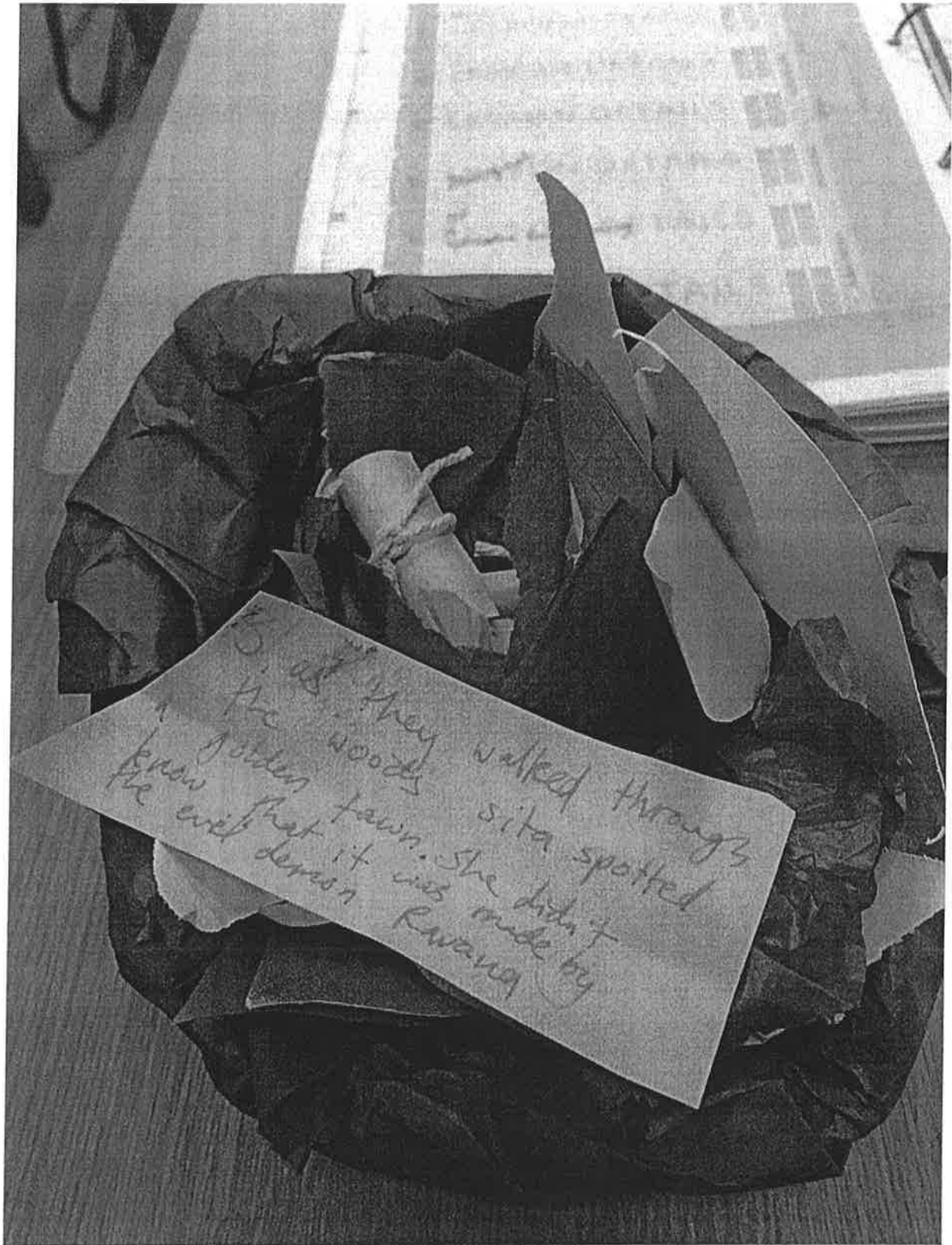

The Hindu Gods

Hindus believe in one supreme god. His name is Brahmin but he can appear in many forms. This means it doesn't matter which god you worship out of the 330,000,000 gods and goddesses there are all just a different side or a different feature of their supreme god. You can just choose the one who makes you feel happy, safe and well cared for. The feature of Brahmin that you think is the best.



Who Are The Main Gods?

Brahma the Creator, Vishnu the Sustainer and Shiva the Destroyer are the three main gods of Hinduism as this is the cycle of life. We are created, preserved and then destroyed.

These are more commonly worshiped as they are the well known gods because Hindus can't be expected to memorise every single Hindu god.

Ganesh

Ganesh is the god of success and wisdom. Ganesh is also honoured as the Remover of Obstacles. He was created by the goddess Parvati. She is the wife of Shiva the Destroyer. The story is that Parvati wanted to take a bath but Shiva was out and there was no one to guard the palace so she created a little boy out of her dirt and told him to not let anyone in. While she was in the bath Shiva returned but the little boy didn't know who he was so he refused Shiva entry. Shiva became furious and cut the boy's head off. When Parvati returned and saw what had happened she was heart broken as she considered the little boy as her son. She sent Shiva and his army to find a suitable head for him. The first thing they saw was a sleeping baby elephant. They cut off its head and put it on the little boy giving him life. Parvati was a little upset that her son had an elephant head but Shiva told her that people would bow down and worship him as one of the greatest Gods, and they do.



Diwali

The Festival of Light

Deepawali or Diwali is the biggest and the brightest of all Hindu festivals. It is the festival of lights: *deep* means "light" and *awali* "a row," or "a row of lights." Diwali is marked by four days of celebration, which literally illuminates the country with its brilliance and dazzles all with its joy.

The Diwali festival occurs in late October or early November. It falls on the 15th day of the Hindu month, Kartik, so it varies every year. Each day of Diwali has its own tale, legend, and myth to tell, all about the amazing story of Rama and Sita.



RAMA AND SITA

Rama was a prince in line to be king and was married to his love, Sita. But his father's new wife wanted her son to be king so she banished Rama and Sita. They were left to live in the forest with Rama's brother, Lakshman. One day Sita saw a golden fawn and she asked Rama to go and get it for her. Little did she know that this was all a trap so that Rama wouldn't be there to protect her. Suddenly the evil demon king Ravana snatched her and took her away to his island kingdom of Lanka. His heart was filled with dread - until he spotted the trail of jewellery. How clever his beautiful wife was, he thought, and he followed the clues she had left behind until they ran out. Now what should he do? Rama didn't know it yet, but help was near at hand, for he had wandered into the kingdom of Hanuman, the monkey-king. As Rama sank to the forest floor in despair, coming towards him he saw a white monkey, Hanuman, the monkey-king himself the one who was in charge of the monkey army. Messages were sent out and before long, monkeys gathered in their millions, ready to search for Sita, Rama's beautiful bride. Their friends, the great bears came too. And so the search began - a search that would last for almost as many years as Rama and Sita's banishment. Hanuman was not only the king of the monkeys, he also possessed special powers, as he could fly like a bird! He flew to island where Sita was trapped, Sita excitedly gave him a pearl from her hair to take to back to Rama. With a flurry of white fur, Hanuman swooped into the sky and was gone as quickly as he had come.



And so Rama, Lakshman and Hanuman prepared for the battle of all battles. As the armies gathered, they realised that Ravana had been very clever in placing his palace on an island, because they couldn't get to him - not unless they could either swim like a fish, or fly like a bird! But Hanuman had a plan and he told the monkey army to work together to build a bridge out of the rocks, grass and sand that lay on the edge of the shore.

As Rama and Lakshman watched in amazement, an army of furry woodland creatures - both small and large - came scuttling out of the undergrowth to help with the bridge building, and before their eyes, a bridge grew until it spanned the distance to the island.

Hanuman's animal army poured across the bridge to the island and the fighting began. The battle was long and terrible - animals and demons fought against each other, good versus evil - but at last, Rama spotted the demon-king. Rama was a great warrior, but in the evil Ravana, he had almost met his match. Each time he swiped his sword at one of Ravana's terrible heads and cut it off, another would straight away grow back in its place. Almost at his wit's end, Rama pulled out the bow that he carried on his back and with it a single arrow. It had been a gift from the gods, and as Rama took aim, he chanted a prayer that the arrow would meet its target. It shot out of the bow with a blinding flash of light and the demon-king fell to the ground, dead. Everyone went back to Rama and the monkey king, Hanuman, who had led the army.

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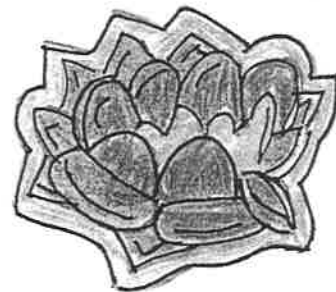

Hinduism originally came from India

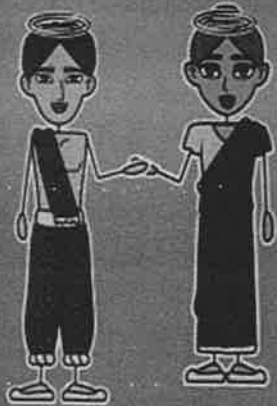
Hinduism has now spread around the world

The Story of Rama and Sita



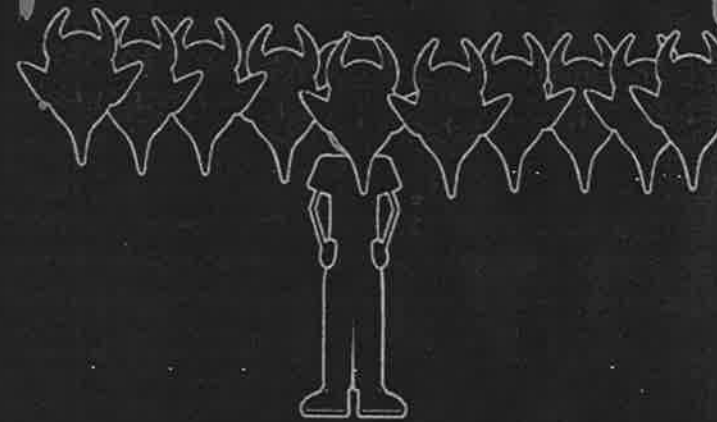
Once upon a time, there was a noble prince called Rama, and he married a princess called Sita.

You must be king!

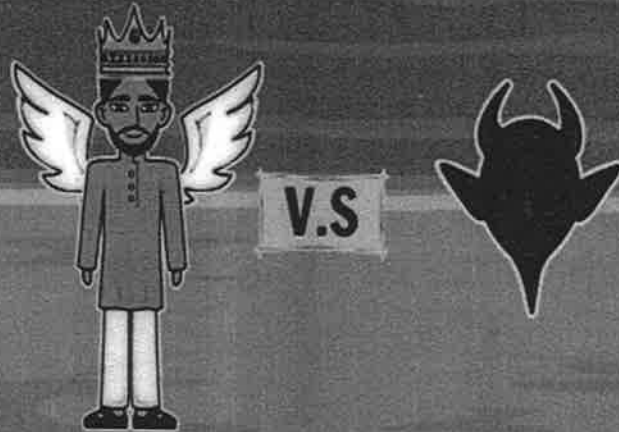


However, they were banished by Rama's evil step-mother so that she could make her own son be king.

Make it informative and catchy and remember to include key words




Write an interview or news report about a main character from your topic.
It can be in any format e.g.. PPT, word etc. but it should be in-depth.


Be an "Expert" on your topic.

Use key words and phrase and maybe even pictures!


