

Why do we have a Pupil Council?



The pupil council is a way of giving pupils a say in the way our school is run and enables them to make changes for the better in our school.

The Pupil Council Committee

The committee is comprised of one elected pupil representative from each class plus one teacher. A pupil council representative is a pupil who shows kindness, understanding and the ability to listen and take on board others' points of views.

The pupil council has regular meetings and the representatives report back to their class. They ensure the Pupil Council noticeboard is kept up to date informing everyone of future events. The minutes of meetings are also posted on the school website.



Pupils can inform the Council of important issues via the following methods:

- A suggestion box in class.
- A notice board
- Pupils can talk to their class representative during a class Pupil Council discussion slot.

2015 - 2016

2014 - 2015

- Anti- bullying and restorative practices were developed across the school.
- Contributed to planning and organising Dream Big Day which enhanced skills for learning, life and work.

- Worked on raising awareness of the SHANARRI wellbeing indicators.
