

Isobel Mair school have been awarded special recognition for their contribution to Clyde in the Classroom 2018.

Class Harris and Class Orkney took part in the initiative this session, which involved:

- A visit to Glasgow Science Centre to learn about the River Clyde
- A loan of a hatchery and scientists visiting the school, to help the pupils take care of 200 trout eggs. The pupils monitored the hatchery for 8 weeks, recording water temperature, conditions and development.
- Pupils visited the Capelrig burn to release the young trout into their local natural habitat
- Class Harris entered the end of project video competition, documenting their efforts and experiences.

We were contacted by Willie Yeomans, Catchment Manager for the Clyde River Foundation, which runs the Clyde in the Classroom project, who awarded Isobel Mair School a special prize for ASN entrants.
