## Did You Know?

- 1 in 6 children in Scotland do not have access to outdoor space to play
- 'Letting children go out to play is one of the best things that parents can do for their health' (Prof R. Mackett, UCL)
- 51% of children and young people have at some point been told to stop playing in the street or area near their home
- There are 11,200 play workers in Scotland working in after school clubs, holiday playschemes, parks, adventure playgrounds, play buses and breakfast clubs
- Without this playing with fantasy, no creative work has ever yet to come to birth. The debt we owe to the play of imagination is incalculable' (Carl Jung)
- 85% of children in Scotland say they do not spend enough time engaged in 'free play'. 76% said that this was due to poor quality of play spaces available.
