As a cluster along with our partner Nursery and Primary schools we were recently reviewed by the Local Authority Education Department's Standards and Quality Review team. The team were reviewing the schools' transition arrangements to ensure that the young people in the Mearns Castle Cluster are receiving a high quality and progressive educational experience from age 3 — 18. The verbal feedback following the review was very positive and the report will be published in the near future. I will share the findings of the Review team with you in due course.

As you know things never stand still in the school and we are continuing to work hard to prepare our S4, S5 and S6 pupils for the forthcoming SQA Exams in May and June. In previous years we have put in place special transport arrangements for our senior pupils during these Exams but for the most part the pupils have not utilised these. This year therefore we are planning to make some changes to our previous arrangements with the intention of continuing to meet our pupils' needs but in a more efficient and effective matter. I will write to you after the Spring Break with more details on the proposed transport arrangements for Senior pupils during the SQA Exam diet.

Our S2, S4 and S5 pupils have now completed their course choices for next session and we are now gearing up for the start of the new timetable for all pupils in early June. In addition we will be hosting our new S1 pupils for next session during two Induction Days at the end of May. This event is the centre piece of our extended transition arrangements that began earlier this term and are designed to prepare the current P7s for becoming Mearns Castle pupils in August.

Finally school closes for the Spring Break at the usual time of 2.45pm on Friday 3rd April. We re-open at 8.45am on Monday 20th April. I hope you and your family have an enjoyable spring Break.

Primary Sector - £1.65 – Hot meal - £1.50 – Cold meal Secondary Sector - £1.75 – Hot meal

Price lists of all foods will be displayed in the dining halls and further detail will be made available through the Diner's News leaflet and Homework Diary.

An improvement in numbers also contributes in minimising the costs of the overall service.










#### LIBRARY NEWS


#### Report By Rebecca Jamieson, Jordan Maxwell and Rona Dalgleish (S5)

Eighty-three pupils from S4 took part in the UK Maths Challenge – with twenty-nine pupils gaining certificates as follows:
