## **School Uniform Matters**

Following extensive consultation with pupils, parents and staff the uniform for all pupils at Mearns Castle High School is as follows:-

#### Blazers

A black blazer (woollen or polyester) with a Mearns Castle High School badge is compulsory for all pupils. Blazers should be worn to and from school. Blazers must also be worn in school at all times but can be removed during lessons.

During inclement weather, pupils can wear a black outdoor jacket over their blazer. Outdoor jackets must then be removed in school and stored in lockers. If appropriate, blazers should be correctly braided. Braiding arrangements are available on our school's website: www.ea.e-renfrew.sch.uk/mearnscastle.

#### Skirts

Two styles of black skirt are compulsory: box pleat or straight.

Dependent on a pupil's height, skirts should be between 18" - 22" in length. As a rule, skirts should be worn no higher than 2" above the knee, with plain black tights or black knee high socks.

#### Trousers

Girls can wear black, formal boot-cut trousers.Boys must wear formal, black school trousers. Trousers must be worn up to the waist. If a belt is worn it must be all black with a plain buckle.

#### Shirts/Jumpers

A formal white school shirt must be worn, tucked in. A plain black v-neck jumper or cardigan, where the tie is clearly visible, can be worn.

#### Headscarves

If girls are choosing to wear a headscarf for religious reasons it must be a plain black headscarf.

#### Ties

An appropriate school tie must be worn up to the neck and properly tied with the school badge clearly visible.

The following school ties are available:

- S1/S2/S3 red tie
- S4/S5 blue tie
- S6 black and red tie

Colours ties are available in all styles for pupils who have achieved School Colours.

Scarf

Two styles of school scarf are available.



#### Footwear

Formal all black school shoes with a black sole and black laces, if appropriate, must be worn.

#### Physical Education Kit

Pupils in S1 to S6 must wear a red Polo shirt. A customised version of the red Polo shirt is also available for pupils studying Higher PE. All pupils must also wear either black tracksuit trousers or black shorts. A black school hooded top is available to be worn during PE or when representing the school at sporting events.

#### Maths Matters

Pupils in the Maths department have had another outstanding year. Many have taken part in national competitions, both on an individual and a team basis. Here are just some of the activities that have captured pupils' interest, together with a list of their successes:

#### United Kingdom Maths Trust

This session, pupils in S2, S5 and S6 entered this Maths competition. Pupils were very successful, with a large number of certificates awarded – ninety-nine! The results were as follows:

#### Primary Maths Challenge

Mrs Anderson again organised our Primary Team Challenge. Pupils from our Cluster Primary schools visited for a morning in May to take part in a range of mathematical activities. By all accounts, this competition was enjoyed by all, with Mearns retaining the trophy.

Once again, we entered this National Competition. Our S5 team was placed in the top ten: we eagerly await the final result!

#### Finance Week

Pupil in S1, S2 and S3 had the opportunity to hone their financial skills by taking part in various activities. In S1, pupils were given the task of developing a business. They were required to identify a product or an experience, devise a plan, and work out costs before making a presentation to a panel of judges. In S2, pupils were tasked with designing a Theme Park and in S3, pupils took part in the BP Challenge, where they were involved in buying and selling oil, taking into account market fluctuations.





#### Code Breaking

Our Code Breakers once again travelled to Manchester in May, to take part in the Alan Turing Competition.



Congratulations to Emma and Anna (new S3), who successfully broke all codes in the competition this year - a first for Mearns Castle! Both girls received certificates from the organisers and a prize from the school.

# Maths

Our third Inter-School Code Breaking competition took place on Thursday 20 June, with visiting teams from Williamwood HS, St Luke's HS and Barrhead HS. The theme this year was "Lord of the Rings". The codes this year were tough to break; however, I am delighted to announce that Mearns Castle were the worthy winners of the trophy for the first time. Our winning team consisted of Sean, Luke and Daniel, all new S2 pupils. We are indebted to Innes and Fiona (new S6) for making up the codes.



As the session draws to a close, pupils and staff alike are looking forward to a good rest, but we'll be back in August, ready to start the next round of competitions and activities!



The international competition "Puzzle of the Week" is still coming to an end in the Maths department. We have had great success this session, currently sitting 3<sup>rd</sup> on the Global leaderboard although the puzzles will continue to be released for a few weeks after we have finished for the Summer Break.



## Social Subjects

Geography, History, Modern Studies

This term saw the Social Subjects faculty successfully deliver the Youth and Philanthropy Initiative (YPI) for the fourth year running to the entire Second Year cohort. YPI allows the pupils to develop a multitude of skills for life, learning and work while forming positive links with the local community.

Pupils were required to develop their understanding of philanthropy through identifying a social issue and championing a local charity with the aim of winning a £3000 donation from the Wood Foundation. Pupils used their time in class and outside school to choose, research and visit their chosen charity and create a presentation asserting why their charity was the most deserving of such a valuable donation. The pupils delivered their presentations to their peers within their class groups before eight groups were selected to compete in the YPI Final on the 30<sup>th</sup> of May.



The YPI project culminated in a grand final in the school theatre where the eight successful finalists delivered their presentations to their peers, charity representatives, teachers and an intimidating panel of judges consisting of a representative from YPI, former Head Girl Iona Ferguson, former Deputy Head Boy Hassan Sheikh and S2 Year Head Mr Donnelly and Depute Head Mr Hale. All finalists delivered their presentations with confidence, enthusiasm and passion; showcasing the dedication and commitment they had shown to this challenge. The standard of presentations gained plaudits across the board and certainly impressed the Wood Foundation's representative in attendance, Alistair Cairns, who remarked that 'the standard of presentation was exceptionally high this year!"

The Winning Group!

After some very hard deliberation by the judging panel,

it was decided that the charity who would be benefiting from the £3000 donation were announced to be **Include** Me 2 Club. The charity had excellent representation from Annabella Rice, Ayaan Sheikh, Anna Fotedar, Leon Buchanan-Widmann, Zia Afzal and Iain James who delivered a fantastic presentation outlining the needs of the charity, their journey as a team and also the importance of the issue through a brilliant, thoughtful video.



The final was hard fought and all of the teams who made it through did themselves and their charities proud. A wide variety of social issues and charities were represented during the final including charities dealing with poverty, supporting those with disabilities, carers, victim support, refugees and the elderly.



All staff in the Social Subjects faculty and the wider school community have been thrilled by the amount of work and effort the pupils have dedicated to this initiative again this year, making it as successful as it was last year. The amount of pupils who spent class time, break times, lunch times and their own time to make this project such a success was amazing to see. One of the great element's of the project was the engagement by all groups with their chosen charity and commitment to aiding them in their causes through independent fundraising contributing to their charities through bake sales, sponsored cycles as well as other endeavours. It is our hope that all of the pupils who engaged with a charity on their journey will continue to do so in the future and can continue to develop their role as responsible and conscientious citizens of East Renfrewshire.

On Saturday 30<sup>th</sup> March, 8 Mearns Castle debaters travelled to Durham to compete at the 2019 Durham Union Schools Debating Competition. The Durham weekend attracts the top debating schools from around the UK and a total of 120 teams were in attendance at this year's competition. All teams debate 3 times on the Saturday and twice on the Sunday in the preliminary rounds before the 'break' to the top 16. The motions on the day were `challenging and varied and included the topics: *abolishing the minimum wage; abolishing patent laws for pharmaceuticals; making Trade Union membership compulsory* and 'cancel culture'.

Mearns Castle entered 3 senior teams and 1 novice team. All four teams achieved at least one 1<sup>st</sup> place finish in the preliminary rounds against top class opposition. However, a special mention goes to **Cerys** (S4) and **Hazel** (S5) who qualified for the last 16 after the early rounds and denied a team from Eton College a place in the later stages. Both girls competed to a high standard in the Quarter Finals but the decision went against them in the end. However, breaking at Durham is a fantastic achievement especially as both Cerys and Hazel were competing against many older and more experienced debaters from some of the top schools in the UK.

This year's competition was organised and hosted by the Cambridge Union. Mearns Castle was represented by **Kirsten** and **Zainab of S3**.Kirsten and Zainab had previously qualified for Finals Day back in January at the Regional qualifier in George Watson's College. The ICYD competition attracts the best junior teams (up to age 16) from the UK and around the world. There were also teams in attendance from Canada, India, Greece and the Netherlands.
