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Space



Planets beyond our solar system



Since 2006, when Pluto was announced as a dwarf planet, our solar system has been home to 8 unique planets. However, humanity's inquisitive nature has led us to ponder a very important question: what about the planets outside of our solar system? Well, those planets are called exoplanets (or extrasolar) and a whopping 5,535 of them have been discovered so far with the first exoplanets being discovered in 1992. Aleksander Wolszczan and Dale Frail used something known as the radial velocity technique to discover not only the first exoplanet, but also the second.

There are 5 categories of exoplanet, Gas Giant, which is a large planet mainly composed of helium or oxygen, Neptunian planets which are much like Neptune and Uranus in our solar system, with the same hydrogen and helium dominated outer atmospheres and rocky cores, Super Earth planets which have a higher mass than earth but a lower mass than ice giants and finally terrestrial planets which are made mostly out of silicone rocks or metals.

The nearest exoplanet to us is Proxima Centauri B. Despite being our nearest exoplanet neighbour, it is still a whopping 4 light years away.

This planet is also one of the closest planets to us that may be able to sustain life. Out of the thousands of planets that have been discovered only 59 are thought to be habitable and there are no signs of other life in our solar system yet. But out of the 100 billion undiscovered planets in the milky way it is possible that there still might be undetected life out there in the universe.

Our New Pitch



We've recently opened up our new sports pitch. It's equipped with a six-lane running track, a 3G turbo pitch in the centre, floodlights and a storage building. Costing over 2 million pounds, and taking over 2 years to build.

It's safe to say that a lot of time and money was invested into this project. We look forward to testing it out!

What was the motivation or reason for building the new pitch?

Mr Gilroy: "Well, there were a number of motivations and reasons. The school is getting bigger, and the number of pupils in the school this year went up significantly and I believe that's going to continue to increase. So as a PE department, having the new pitch has been a

massive benefit for us because previously there were lots of people on one pitch and there was very little room, especially during Covid times. This now gives us a lot more facilities, which is great when it comes to particular parts in the year, particularly athletics time and summer Games time. When we're all outside we've got two massive outdoor areas that we can use, and it means we can split up the area more beneficially."

Show did the school plan for such a big project?

"So I think certainly, like I said, because we are just teachers, we weren't too involved in the planning of it. I first became aware of a number of years ago, we're talking about maybe the school year beginning 2021. It was probably when we first started seriously hearing about the pitch. Now works began in the pitch around summer time so April 2022. Now it obviously took a bit longer than we expected it to. We were expecting to have access to it in August last year, and obviously it's taken a little bit longer than that, as we never really got access to it until the end of the school term."



Do you think it was worth it? The amount of money, work and time that went into the new pitch?

"Well, it was obviously a lot of money. It was a big investment. I believe that the money that was spent on it would be massively beneficial no matter what whatever area it was put into. However we're certainly going to be able to use this pitch for years to come. It will definitely help improve the quality of our PE classes and it's really given us a lot of world class facilities. You should come down sometime at lunchtime and you'll see that we have more than a hundred pupils who come and use it every single lunchtime. It's definitely helped make teaching PE easier, and has definitely helped and impacted a lot of students. However, because it is such an amazing facility. I'd like to see maybe it getting used a bit more at night than for external clubs."

And lastly, does the PE department have any big plans for the future?



"I think as a PE department, we always have big plans for the future. Like I said, the school is growing, which means, obviously our facilities are growing. We have restructured a lot of our courses and in terms of National 5 PE a lot more pupils have now selected Nat5 then ever before. So in our current fourth years, we have three national PE classes, and in our third years we have 7 or 8. That's a significant increase, which is, again, why the facility is so beneficial for us to have because it's going to give them access to more marks for their national five performance.

We've also developed what's called an NPA or National Progression Award. So it is a fantastic, fantastic course that we've developed where when you get to S5 or S6, you would be able to teach younger pupils and primary school pupils sport. So even just last year I had a class of 24, this year there's 40. So we've got two classes doing it. And I don't know if you've seen from our Twitter, we were in the primary school across the road for St Clair's and Calderwood Lodge last week. The feedback from the primary kids was really positive and our pupils are learning a lot from it. So I think, to answer your question, plans for the future just to develop, continue to develop kind of the curriculum opportunities for pupils to gain more experience."

The new pitch will certainly have a huge impact on the school. It is a new fresh start to athletics in MCHS. Think about it; this new pitch will be used by students who join the school 50 years from now. We'll win and lose games here, have fun and make memories with friends. (At the very least we'll be less overcrowded in the games hall).

Just as Mr Gilroy said "PE shouldn't just be coming down and playing games, it should be about developing our confidence, developing our ability to stand up in front of people and confidently play your sport, and the new patch has been a great asset in allowing us to do that."

So let's all say hello the start of a new sporting era here in MCHS.



PUMPKIN SPICED

LATTE



Looking for a new drink to spice up the season? Look no further. The creamy milk, bold espresso, hint of pumpkin and notes of spices create the perfect sense of warmth. The invention of this latte is owed to Starbucks, and it has grown to be a very popular drink since its' 2003 debut. It is the 20th anniversary of the creation and what better way to honour it by making it yourself? And why not bake some sweet pumpkin spice cookies to complement it!

INGREDIENTS

- 2 tsp pumpkin purée
- pinch of ground cinnamon, plus extra to serve (or use pumpkin spice)pinch of ground ginger
- pinch of ground nutmeg
- 30ml espresso or strong coffee

METHOD

- 1. Measure out the pumpkin purée into a heat resistant cup.
- 2. Sprinkle in the variety of spices
- 3. Pour in the previously prepared espresso(add boiling water to ground espresso)
- 4. In a saucepan, warm up the milk at a low temperature. It will look foamy and release steam when ready.
- 5. Place into a cup of any kind and remove excess froth. Mix until the ingredients are blended well.
- 6. Lastly sprinkle a spice of your choice (e.g., cinnamon) and enjoy.









PUMPKIN SPICED

COOKIF.5

These cookies are inspired by the famous Starbucks pumpkin spiced latte. The yare delicious, quick and easy to make, taking less than half an hour to complete. With warming spices and the incredible pumpkin flavour, these are truly the perfect Autumnal treat.

INGREDIENTS (MAKES 6)

- 40g butter (melted) 50g granulated sugar
- 75g plain flour
- 30g pumpkin puree
 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 35g chocolate chips

Spices:

- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon ginger paste







METHOD

- 1. Preheat the oven to 190C/fan170C/gas 5 and line one baking tray with greaseproof paper.
- 2. Mix the granulated sugar and melted butter in a bowl using a wooden spoon.
- 3. Sift the flour and baking powder into the bowl and fold them into the batter.
- 4. Dollop in the pumpkin puree and sprinkle in the
- spices- cinnamon, nutmeg and ginger paste 5. Add the chocolate chips and stir thoroughly until the mixture is smooth and creamy.
 6. Scoop about 1-2 tablespoons of the dough on to the
- baking tray for each cookie
- 7. Put in the oven and bake for around 10-12 minutes until golden brown.
- 8. Remove from the oven and leave them on the baking tray for a few minutes before placing them on a wire rack to cool.



CHOCOLATE MUFFINS

INGREDIENTS

1 medium egg
62ml vegetable oil
125ml semi-skimmed milk
125g golden caster sugar
175g self-raising flour
25g cocoa powder
¼ tsp salt
100g chocolate chips




- Heat oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Line a muffin tray with paper muffin cases. In a large bowl, beat 1 medium egg lightly for 1 min.
- Add 62ml vegetable oil and 125ml semi-skimmed milk and beat until just combined then add 125g golden caster sugar and mix until you have a smooth batter.
- Sift in 175g self-raising flour, 25g cocoa powder, and ¼ tsp salt then mix until just smooth. Be careful not to over-mix the batter as this will make the muffins tough.
- Stir in 100g chocolate chips.
- Fill muffin cases two-thirds full and bake for 20-25 mins, until risen, firm to the touch and a skewer inserted in the middle comes out clean.
- Leave the muffins in the tin to cool for a few mins and transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.


