My religion is what I am known as, I'm not ashamed to stand on the rooftops and proclaim my faith and why should I be, because in the beautiful words of Galatians Chapter 6 verse 14:

"May I never boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, through which the world has been crucified to me, and I to the world."


I am Catholic and I am proud to be Catholic and proud that people can recognise these traits in me and me in them.

Parents are children's first teachers and the family is the basis all things. For me, my faith began at an early age, probably in my earliest days, I was baptised at two months old, on February 7th 1999 and I believe that my faith has



I am sure that I speak for all who go to Youth Group on Sundays when I say that the NET teams are really enthusiastic, they always have time for you no matter how busy they are and really help us to mature with and in our
