



Consequences of more competition

- Higher entry requirements
 - Be realistic. Is it achievable?
 - Research the course entry requirements. These may differ between different universities
 - Students need to ask themselves, will they meet the requirements by the end of S6? (the accumulative grades)
 - Are there any specified subjects required?



Consequences of more competion

- S5 attainment is often not enough. Universities increasingly want to see progress in S6
 - S6 students should be following a curriculum of 4 subjects in addition to attending PE,
 PSHE and RE
 - Opportunity for vocational courses
 - S6 Service Volunteering and Leadership
- The key is for students to develop and broaden their skills
 - Personal statements are becoming more important for many courses e.g. Teaching,
 Nursing, Law, Engineering, 'people centred' / vocational courses





- Have an open mind e.g. the degree may give them the opportunity to apply for numerous career/ employment/ graduate schemes



What is the purpose of the Personal Statement?

- The personal statement gives you the opportunity to tell the university why they should pick you above other candidates.
- You must give the best account of yourself!

Advice from University of Glasgow:



- Pupil should demonstrate an understanding of the programme they are undertaking and commitment to the profession
- Useful to show where they have overcome adversities
- Should show holistic view of pupil
- If pupils applying for joint honours/multiple fields cover both areas and link transferable skills between subjects – wouldn't be disadvantaged at UoG for choosing multiple different areas



Getting started

- Do your research!
- Check entry requirements
- Check what skills are required
- Everything in your personal statement should aim to show that you have the skills and qualities they are looking for

How to plan your personal statement



Things to know:

- 1. It's the hardest part of completing your application – make sure you allocate enough time to do it justice.
- 2. Think about any work experience, part-time jobs, or qualifications e.g. Extended Project Qualification - you could include.
- 3. Our resources on ucas.com/ personalstatement will help you.





Go to a UCAS exhibition or university open days to ask admissions tutors what they want to see in a personal statement. Remember to write down ideas!

UCAS exhibitions run from March to July (August to September in Scotland), Outside the UK, events are hosted by the **British Council** Education UK.

Make changes

Show your redrafted statement to your parents, teacher, or careers adviser for a final check.

Deadline Copy and paste your final statement into Apply by the deadline.

Re-read it before you ao for an interview – it may form the basis for their questions.

Opening Paragraph

- Why you want to study the course
- It should give convincing reasons for your choice of course and show that serious research has been undertaken into the subject
- Show enthusiasm, interest, excitement
- Avoid dramatic openings/clichés



Opening Paragraph

 From a young age I have always been a keen reader and growing up I have expanded my knowledge of history, culture, politics, and religion through reading various books by a wide range of different authors. I make a conscious effort to broaden the diversity of my reading and have always been keen to read a variety of literature including poetry, plays and novellas from varying time periods. The study of English literature has always interested me as I have enjoyed the critical analysis of literature extracts in school from National 5 through to Advanced Higher and I am keen to further develop and enhance the analytical skills I have gained in my academic experience so far.



What makes you suitable to study the subject?

- planning, designing and safely carrying out experiments/practical investigations to test given hypotheses or to illustrate particular effects
- carrying out experiments/practical investigation safely, recording detailed observations and collecting data
- selecting information from a variety of sources
- presenting information appropriately in a variety of forms
- processing information (using calculations and units, where appropriate)
- · making predictions and generalisations from evidence/information
- drawing valid conclusions and giving explanations supported by evidence/justification
- evaluating experiments/practical investigations and suggesting improvements
- communicating findings/information effectively

 Through my work experience at Isobel Mair, an additional support needs school, I have learned to work in a difficult environment whilst prioritising the needs of others, I have also learned to analyse behaviour and find a best suited solution for the problem. Through attending open days for English literature and classics I have expanded my knowledge of the course and have started to focus my external reading on books that relate to both. These open days have revealed to me the various aspects that the course will cover in more detail than the course specifications which has deepened my interest in the study of literature.



 By assisting pupils in the lower school during their English reading periods I have been able to share my interest in the subject whilst expanding their familiarity and awareness of reading and its importance. In addition, I also help pupils in the lower school in first year history which reminds me of the early topics in history that I have previously covered and gives me the opportunity to share my love for another subject that I take great interest in. Helping in my schools creative writing club has allowed scope for my own personal writing in addition to supporting younger pupils with their works and overall confidence in the creative writing aspect of the course.

Conclusion

- What research you have undertaken (open days, prospectuses, discussions etc) that has helped inform your choice and application.
- Demonstrate that you will be hardworking
- Understand the demands of life at university
- Closing statement –summarise your suitability and interest for the course
- E.g. "If successful in my application, I will strive to be fully committed to the course, and intend to live up to the high standards which I have set myself. I look forward to the challenges that university will bring."



What to Avoid

- Mentioning a particular University
- Exaggerating
- Arrogance
- Waffling or flowery language
- Poor spelling and grammar
- Clichés
- Plagiarism UCAS uses software that will identify sections of text that have been copied



Limit

4000 characters including spaces or 47 lines

Whichever one comes first

- You need to be concise



Summary

- Show that you know your strengths and can outline your ideas clearly
- Use words you know will be understood by the person reading your statement
- Be enthusiastic if you show your interest in the course, it may help you get a place
- Expect to produce several drafts of your personal statement before being totally happy with it
- Ask people you trust for their feedback.



What pupils need to do

- Conduct thorough research on courses and universities/colleges
- Prepare well organise your time to dedicate sufficient effort to personal statement
- Keep up-to-date with announcements on S6 UCAS Teams page
- Liaise closely with your Pastoral Support Teacher
- Take responsibility this is your application and your future
