Catholic Education Week takes place each year from the Feast of St Margaret of Scotland (16th November) until the Feast of St Andrew (30th November). Schools and parishes are asked to consider which week within this fortnight best suits their local community for marking this important aspect of the school year.

The Catholic Church in Scotland encourages schools, parishes and other agencies to work closely together in order to celebrate the successes of Catholic education particularly during one week each year. The purpose of Catholic Education Week is to highlight the significance of education, not only for young people but for society as a whole. Students, parents, teachers and others are asked to reflect on their own roles in the education process – at home, in school, in the local parish and in other educational settings.

SCES provides support materials linked to each year's chosen theme to assist schools and parishes in their own plans to draw attention to the added value which Catholic schools bring across Scotland. Promotional events, liturgical celebrations, particular classroom lessons and school activities are encouraged in schools and parishes throughout this week. The materials provided can be used at other times of the year.

THE THEME FOR 2022/2023 "Communion, Participation, Mission"

This was a new initiative piloted by Mrs. Kearney, St. Thomas' RE Co-ordinator. 
Raising Money for SCIAF

Our school continues to support our parish Children's Liturgy Group by encouraging our pupils to attend through regular Tweets.




Rosary Group & Pope Francis Faith Award


"Saint Bernadette, Pray for Us."

The Oscar Romero Award Aspire to be more

We were delighted to announce in June that we were the first school in the Paisley Diocese to receive the Oscar Romero Award.

The Oscar Romero Award supports schools to embed the key principles of Catholic Social Teaching in their ethos and culture, so that all within the school can experience life to the full. It will also support schools find ways of being 'good news' to the local, national and global community in their own unique way.

We decided to make an application for the Participator Level which involved the school self-assessing what we already do – how are we living our mission as a Catholic community. The Participator Level had three areas that we had to submit evidence for:

Strategic Curriculum Practical

We submitted a great deal of evidence for each strand: policy documents, letters home to parents, lesson plans and structures, photographs from twitter as well as a summary statements for each of the three areas that make up the award. The summary statements reflect all the evidence that is submitted for the award.






Laudato Si



Staff Development





Our staff have been using collegiate time to deepen their understanding of *This Is Our Faith* and share good practice in teaching Religious Education. Led by Miss McKay and Miss McAlpine, they are reflecting on the strands of faith and core learning within *This Is Our Faith* and considering how these are incorporated across the curriculum.

Religious Education across the curriculum

In Primary 4, the children have been learning that God created everyone, mind, body and soul; with their own unique blend of talents and abilities. They enjoyed creating self-portraits of their mind and body. They then had a very insightful discussion about the way in which each person contributes to the class community by sharing their God-given talents and skills. As well as the range of talents and abilities, the children were also learning that God has given everyone the gift of free will. The children worked together in groups to act out a range of scenarios, followed by a discussion about the good or bad choices made within the story, linking this to choices made in their daily lives.





In preparation for their Nativity performance, Primary 1 listened to the story of Jesus' birth in class. They talked about the different events that took place and then drew and retold the story in their own words. They are looking forward to being able to use their music and drama skills to share the good news of Jesus' birth with our school community.
