School Uniform

It is great to see so many children so beautifully turned out each morning. It really sets the tone for the day ahead and creates a very favourable impression of Thornliebank Primary within the community. We strongly endorse and recommend that our Primary 6 and 7 pupils wear a white shirt and a Thornliebank tie every day. Black trousers/ skirt, black jumper or cardigan and appropriate black shoes should also be worn. From Primary 1 to Primary 5 there is a choice between wearing a white shirt and Thornliebank tie or a yellow polo shirt and black Thornliebank sweatshirt. We discourage the wearing of all jewellery with the exception of small, easily-removable stud earrings. Our uniform policy followed extensive parent consultation and is in line with East Renfrewshire's 'Dressing for Excellence' policy which is advocated in all of the authority's schools.

School Improvement Priorities

Each year we write a School Improvement Plan which sets out the targets we hope to achieve by the end of the session. Our plan focuses on key improvements for the course of the session and allows us to bring together national, local and school priorities while continuing to emphasise Thornliebank's unique vision and values. This year our priorities are organised within 4 strategic aims: Self- evaluation, Curriculum Design, Raising Attainment and Recognising Achievement and Equalities. In addition, Getting it Right for Every Child and Developing the Young Workforce strategies as well as a commitment to optimising parental engagement permeate each of our aims. Meet the Teacher/ Find Out More Day

We hosted our Meet the Teacher Event on Wednesday 24 August from 3.30-4.30. Many parents were able to attend and had the opportunity to see their child's classroom and meet their new teacher. Evidence shows that the event was better attended than last year and feedback comments from parents were overwhelmingly positive. Almost all parents indicated that they wished to see the event continue in future sessions. A few parents mentioned that they would prefer to see the

event revert back to a later time slot. This feedback will be added to the results of the wide-reaching family engagement stakeholder information that we hope to gather and analyse throughout the course of the session.

Our Find Out More Day for Primary 2-7 took place on Tuesday 20 September. This is an opportunity for family members to visit the school and see a lesson in action. Children were taking part in learning across a wide range of curricular areas, from Literacy and Numeracy to PE and Drama, giving families a flavor of the diversity of experiences in any one day at Thornliebank Primary. Feedback comments from family members included:

Class News

Primary 1 have been learning all of their single sounds and have started blending their first letters. They have been focusing on number recognition, number formation and counting and some children have already started to add.

Primary 2 have been developing group discussion skills while thinking about 'needs' and 'wants' and linking this to their class charters, Rights Respecting Schools initiatives and their Sukkot and Harvest studies.

Primary 3 have been developing note-taking skills as they explore 'The Vikings' learning context and consider the factors that made the Vikings unique in history

Tuesday 6 September saw all Primary 4 pupils being invited to the grand opening of the new David Lloyd Club on Stewarton Road. The children received an hour of tennis coaching from Judy Murray, a back-pack full of goodies and a significant amount of media attention. Many thanks to all at David Lloyd and to Mrs McDonald for organising.

Primary 4 and Primary 5 pupils are half way through their 6-week block of swimming lessons which we are paying for with school funds. Not only are the children developing an essential life skill, they also seem to be having a great deal of fun. As with all trips, we are extremely grateful to our parent helpers, without whom the swimming lessons would not be able to go ahead. We are also extremely appreciative to all who contribute to school fundraising activities which allow our

children to have these experiences. An additional session has been organized for October 27 to replace the cancelled session on September 28.

Primary 6 been looking in-depth at the Paralympic Games and have been developing their research skills as they investigate the range of sports that take place as well as the history and impact of the Paralympic movement.

Primary 7 used the Olympics as the stimulus for their participation in this year's Lord Provost's debate. They have also been developing their report writing skills through their investigations in to natural disasters.

Main Street Crossing Patrol

Facilities Management have indicated that they have a vacancy for a Schools Crossing Patrol Officer for the crossing at Main Street. This post, which is subject to a PVG (Children) check, is for 10 hours per week. If you or anyone you know within the local community would be interested in taking up this important role, please do not hesitate to get in touch with me so that I can pass on the relevant contact details to Facilities Management.

I would also ask that all parents and carers parking or dropping-off on Bangorshill Street exercise extreme caution. The street can become extremely congested from 8.45 am and again at the end of the day. We all have a collective duty to ensure the safety of all children in our school and nursery and I would urge you to contact Giffnock Police Station immediately if you witness any incidences of dangerous driving or parking.
