The satellites are launched, flat packed, using Falcon 9 rockets. Over 400 are already in a low Earth orbit and have been spotted by stargazers from across the globe flying past in a satellite train.

Eventually the network will comprise of over 12,000 tiny satellites orbiting Earth. The project has had a lot of criticism from astronomers and stargazers who fear the introduction of these man-made objects could mean the night sky is about to change forever.




