# <u> Grammar – Suffixes</u>

A suffix is a word ending.

The suffix ed tells us that an action has happened in the past.

I smashed the plate.

The suffix **ing** is used with the verb "to be" to tell us that an action is in the present tense or the past tense.

I am throwing the ball. I was throwing the ball.

The suffix **er** makes a new word.

Lots of these new words are comparative adjectives, comparative adverbs or nouns.

One lady was calmer than the other one.

Hint: comparative adverbs and comparative adjectives are used to compare things.

When we add **ed**, **ing**, or **er** to words, we sometimes have to double the last letter.

We usually double the last letter if the one before it is a single vowel.
