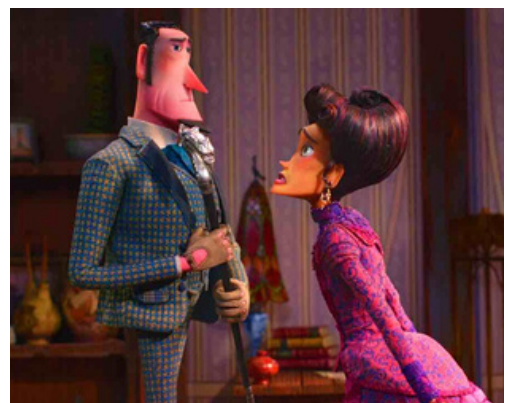

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Making the film...

Mise-en-scene is a term used in film making that means "placed on stage" (or screen). It is how the director uses **props**, **costumes** and **colour** to make you believe the scene is real.

Look at **Lionel's study**. What can you tell about Lionel from the way the director has used **elements of mise-en-scene**? Think about the decorations and items in the room.



Pick any other location in the film and explain how **mise-en-scene** has been used to let you know who lives or works there and what kind of place it is.

Missing Link was made by **Laika Studios** who specialise in **stop-motion animation**. This type of animation involves moving puppets in tiny steps, taking pictures of each change then playing the pictures one after another to create a moving image.
