
Eucharistic Adoration

Armistance Day



Armistice Day is the 11th November (the day on which the armistice was signed to end the First World War - at 11.00am on the 11th day of the eleventh month).

Remembrance Sunday is the Sunday nearest to Armistice Day and is the national day of remembrance in the UK. Schools mark remembrance of the war dead on a suitable day around this time.

In recent years, the custom of stopping for the 2-minutes silence at 11.00am on 11th November has grown enormously and is widely practiced in public places. You may wish to use the resource during prayers on Thursday or Friday.

As the world commemorates the centenary of the end of the First World War, you may wish to use these visuals with your own two minute silence to commemorate the millions of lives lost during WW1.





The Month of the Holy Souls

During November throughout the world those who have died are especially remembered and prayed for by the Catholic community. The Commemoration of the Dead begins on second day of the month and is commonly known as All Souls when Catholics pray for the dead as they continue, ahead of the living, the journey into the fullness God's Light.

Catholics also pray for those who are left behind and are still grieving. These prayers continue throughout the month of November, with people encouraged to visit a church or cemetery to pray. Know that, whatever your faith background, you and your loved ones will be prayed for and remembered during November.

Jesus Christ conquered death through his own suffering and death on a cross and by his resurrection. In Him is the source of our hope and light whatever darkness we might currently face.

His love for us and those that we love is endless.



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1. MEET DEADLINES

Meet deadlines for <u>drafts</u> & final submissions

 Do not put yourself under pressure where you may be tempted to act out of character.

Keep teachers informed

Speak to teachers if struggling



2. SOURCES

Identify & Acknowledge source materials

Use "quotation marks"

Label the sources of diagrams or Illustrations

Include a bibliography (list of references) where appropriate

3. PLAGIARISM is a form of CHEATING

- Passing off the work of others as your own.
- Copying passages from the internet
- Asking someone else to write an essay for you
- Failing to acknowledge sources of information you have used in your work.
- It is plagiarism if some or all of your work has been done by someone else – brother, sister, friend, parent, tutor, teacher

To guard against Plagiarism

- DO NOT pretend the work of others (friend, older sibling, parent, teacher, internet essay bank) is your own work
- DO NOT copy from another source (book or internet)
- DO NOT use example work prepared by your teacher.
- DO NOT cut and paste from the internet
- DO NOT submit work to an internet site before you send it to SQA

4. COLLUSION is a form of CHEATING

- Working with others when you should be working alone
- Giving help
- Getting help
- Sharing passwords/files
- Lending out materials
- Everyone involved is cheating
- ✓ Speak to our teachers if concerned



To guard against Collusion

- DO NOT work with others unless you are taking part in group work
- DO NOT borrow the work/materials of any other candidate
- DO NOT share your work with others or lend materials to any other candidate
- DO NOT email part or all of any work you have produced to someone else.
- DO NOT allow someone to access your computer
- DO NOT provide your password to anyone or allow access to your saved files

DETECTING PLAGIARISM (CHEATING) IS NOT DIFFICULT

- Suspected by teachers— checking drafts etc
- Spotted easily by markers
 – pieces will be referred for investigation
- SQA sophisticated computer software matches copied phrases/pieces of text with original sources
- Every suspected case will be investigated.
- A penalty will be applied if guidelines have been broken

5. LANGUAGE

- ✓ You require to show respect
- Do not include rude, abusive, offensive or discriminatory language/images
- DO NOT include rude, abusive or discriminatory language or images
- DO NOT include anything frivolous or irrelevant in the Coursework you submit



SQA Penalties

A warning issued

Reduce or award ZERO marks for that piece of work.

Cancellation of your entry for the subject concerned

Cancellation of all your subject entries for 2015



6. CHECK AND DOUBLE CHECK!!

- CHECK the contents of your work carefully before it is submitted for marking.
- ✓ All your own work?
- ✓ Source materials acknowledged?

✓ Language appropriate?

- SQA will be informed of anyone found cheating in a Unit Assessments or Prelim, or who is suspected of submitting coursework that is not their own.
- You are likely to have your entry for that subject cancelled




GOOD PRACTICE


- ✓ Read SQA Your Coursework 2018-19 and comply with contents
