What will my timetable look like?

At Primary School you have the same teacher all day, every day. Secondary School is different. Here you will study a range of subjects taught by teachers and you will move around a lot more.

At Secondary School the day is divided into periods. On Monday, Tuesday and Thursday there are 7 periods and the day finishes at 3:30pm. On Wednesday and Friday there are 6 periods and the day finishes at 2:40pm.

As you can see there are 33 periods in a school week at St Ninian's. You go to each subject a certain number of periods per week:

Art and Design (@stniniansart)

First year Art and Design involves lots of creating, designing, developing, problem solving, and expressing yourself through the use of a wide variety of exciting materials and media.

Your creative and artistic skills will improve through drawing, painting, printing, 3D model making and sculpting with clay and papier mache.

You will have lots of opportunities to create individual pieces of art work from a variety of themes, including foreign culture and portraiture and you will learn many skills and techniques in the process. Design activity will involve you in researching, developing ideas and creating a final design idea - this could be a clay pot or a phone stand. Your critical skills will be developed by looking at the work of artists and designers.

Involvement in art and design will encourage your creativity and your ability to be innovative, imaginative and inventive.

You will also be able to look at and be inspired by art and design work in local and national galleries during our first year inspirational gallery trip.



Business Education

You will only have a short taster course in Business Education—probably 5 weeks. In our department we cover 3 subjects: Accounting, Administration and Business Management and in the taster course we will give you an impression of some of the work we do. We will look at needs and wants, differences between rich and poor countries, global brands, marketing and product development.

Most of the course takes the form of a project where you are a marketing "expert" and along with others in your team have to design a new product and its associated marketing campaign. Yes, it is a lot to cover in a short time but it will give some idea of what you can choose to do in S2.



3D Design

Pupils will work in both Art and Design and the Design and Technology department to develop their creative skills through knowledge and understanding of the design process.

The theme for this course is Future Architecture. Pupils will develop skills using



- Photoshop
- Google Sketch up
- Inventor

Pupils will combine learning from both Art and Design and Design Technology to produce a 3-D design in response to the given brief. Pupils will have the opportunity to develop their problem solving to produce a creative design that fulfils the brief.

Throughout the course pupils will be expected to make connections in their design process by looking at the work of relevant artists and designers exploring techniques and creative approaches to Art & Design practice.

This is a valuable course in developing a range of transferrable skills which can be used in may areas of the curriculum.







<u>Design and Technology</u> (@StNiniansDandT)

During S1 you will develop a range of skills in both the classroom and the workshop.

In the workshop you will learn to use hand and machine tools safely to produce models.

In the classroom you will develop manual sketching skills and learn how to use 3D modelling software. You will also be taught about the principles of design which you will put to use during several projects.

English (@stninianseng)

During S1 you will develop the skills of Reading, Writing, Talking and Listening that you acquired in Primary.

- In the <u>first</u> term you will study a short story then use what you have learned to write your own.
- In the <u>second</u> term you will study a Novel or a Play or a Media text and be given the chance to reflect on the writer's ideas and craft. You will write critically on the text, developing skills in analysis and understanding.
- The **third** term focuses on enhancing the skills of listening and talking.
- You will produce a persuasive text in the **fourth** term while studying another literary text.









Throughout the year you will enhance your close reading skills, reinforce your grammatical knowledge and experiment with different types of writing. You will also be continually encouraged to extend the variety of texts you read privately.

Drama

The study of Drama develops the concept of using language, movement and theatre to explore relationships within the real and imagined world.

In S1, you are involved in examining and exploring both

improvised and scripted Drama work. You will explore and develop the performance techniques of voice and movement.

You will also investigate Drama structure as well as exploring the effectiveness of conventions such as Soliloquy, Flash-Back and Freeze-Frame.

Through the creative group process, you will continue to develop both inter-personal and teamwork skills as almost all practical activities and exercises will entail paired or group work. You will use problem solving and negotiating skills almost every period in Drama. At all levels, there is an equal emphasis between written and practical work.

Geography

History

You will develop your skills of knowledge, understanding and evaluating information. You will have the opportunity to work on your own, with a partner or in a group situation.

Topics:

The Scottish Wars of Independence

Students will learn about the succession crisis and the reign of John Balliol. Students will then learn about Edward I's Interference in Scottish affairs and the

emergence of William Wallace and Robert Bruce as key figures in Scottish history.



The second topic allows you to experience an era of great change in history. Popular music took on a new importance in people's lives as did the impact of individuals such as John F Kennedy and Martin Luther King Jnr. You will be given the opportunity to investigate this decade.

Home Economics

S1 Home Economics is a practical based course.

Food for Health – Students will develop practical skills in food preparation and cooking. Through making a variety of dishes students will develop a knowledge and understanding of safe working practices, safe handling of food and healthy food choices.

Food and the Consumer – Students will develop knowledge of the factors that affect food choice and food labelling. In this unit students will follow a design brief to create a healthy dish for a teenager

Textile Technology- Pupils follow a design brief, demonstrating the use of textile skills in a practical and creative way to make a cushion.



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Information Technology

In ICT pupils follow a computer based course which covers the main uses of computers in creating, presenting and handling data.


The course is broken into the following units:

- 1. Computer Games Design
- 2. Computer Hardware
- 3. Computer Graphics
- 4. Communication and creating wikis
- 5. Developing a website
- 6. Scratch programming
- 7. Environmental issues and cyber bullying





Pupils work is assessed with a project in which each pupil will be given the opportunity to set up a video games company, create a website to advertise the company and the creation of a final game.



Mathematics


In S1 we will build on your current mathematical abilities through the study of the following: algebra, percentages, decimals and fractions amongst other topics.

You will have the opportunity to extend your problem solving skills and work on projects such as 'Famous Mathematicians' in order to gain a broader

understanding of mathematics and numeracy in everyday life.

Remember, everyone 'counts' in the maths department!





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Modern Languages

S1 French will be a busy, demanding and exciting year!

- You will build on the French that you have learned in primary school.
- You will learn more about the French people and how they live.
- You will learn about France and other French speaking countries.
- You will be asked to do some research at home.
- You will find it very useful to have your own dictionary to help you with some of the reading tasks you will be given for homework.
- From time to time there will be competitions and activities that you can take part in.





Modern Studies

- Rights and Responsibilities (Children's Rights - including 'Child Soldiers)
- Prejudice and Discrimination

Pupils will make comparisons between the lives of young people in Scotland and the experience Of young people across the world. You will be given the opportunity to work in groups, discuss and debate issues and draft reports. The course includes active learning opportunities such as "A Shoe Making Factory" as well as use of IT and video reviews.





Music



Performing is at the centre of all music making and this is represented in our S1 course. In S1 the focus is on acquiring instrumental skills and, after a short taster course on keyboard, xylophone, guitar, bass guitar and drum kit, you will choose the 2 instruments you wish to specialise in. Instrumental development is encouraged through group performance and individual practice. Listening skills, musical literacy and composition will also be introduced and consolidated during practical sessions.

Physical Education

The S1 PE programme focuses on developing your skills in a variety of different activities including: basketball, gymnastics, badminton, football, athletics and dance. You will be given opportunities to analyse your own and other pupils' performance to help you to develop your ability to evaluate performance and therefore improve your performance in a range of activities. You will work both individually and with classmates in group situations.

As you work through the various activities in your course you will also develop your knowledge and understanding of health and fitness and you will get

opportunities to assess your own level of fitness and to monitor improvement over time. Fun events which the PE department organises each year for S1 include: a sports day, a Christmas ceilidh and a skipathon sponsorship event.



In Physical Education the dress code is:

- Sky blue polo shirt
- Black or navy shorts/tracksuit trousers
- Training shoes which have built in support (not fashion shoes)
- Hooded sweatshirt for outside

P. E. kit must be worn even if you are unwell or injured, so you can be included in the class and take an 'active' part in the lesson. No football or designer tops, shorts, tracksuit trousers should be worn in Physical Education. For health and safety reasons, no eating or wearing of jewellery is allowed.

Religious Education



The S1 Religious Education programme is centred on an indepth study of the Sacraments and why they are important for young adults. The course helps you see you are a special person, loved by God and full of talents and gifts which will help you in your life. However, these gifts and talents are there to help other people.

Each class will take part in a Retreat on the theme of Living as a Community. The R.E teacher leads the classes through



activities, games and prayer which will help you understand the meaning of community. In May, groups of pupils will be able to visit Carfin Lourdes Grotto and find out about the history of this national site. The visit to Carfin will finish with a special Mass in the Glass Chapel before going off to spend the afternoon at M&D's Funpark.

Science



In Science we carry out experiments to find out how the world works. You will learn to plan and carry out experiments in the Science labs. You will find answers to questions like:

How fast can I run?
How does a parachute work?
How much energy is in a Hula Hoop?
What does genetically modified mean?
What is evolution?

Much of the work that is done in PSHE will be as discussion, though there will be written work too. We will also look at the 'Focus for the Week' which is decided by the Head teacher and is discussed in all PSHE classes throughout the school.

Your Pastoral Teacher will also discuss your reports with you and help you to learn how to improve. This is done by helping you set targets and using the various strands of information that we have to show where you can do better.



Curriculum for Excellence

During your time at St Ninian's you will follow a curriculum that will help you develop the attributes, knowledge and skills you will need to flourish in life, learning and work.

The knowledge, skills and attributes will allow you to become:

- Successful Learners
- Confident Individuals
- Effective Contributors
- Responsible Citizens

Interdisciplinary Learning

You will be given many opportunities to undertake interdisciplinary learning. This is where you will study a specific topic from a variety of perspectives. Some examples of interdisciplinary work are:

Rapid Response

All pupils are introduced to a scenario where they have to imagine they are engineers going to help people who have very little infrastructure left after the storm and where a period of preparation and training takes place. During the training time, subject departments work across the school curriculum on materials, developed by staff, which is linked to the hurricane theme.



The S1 year group is divided into teams who work together in the subject areas with the lessons taking place during the normal school timetable. At the end of this time period, the pupils, still in their teams, work through four different bases during the activity day.

Internet Safety

This is a very important topic and is raised in several subjects. In Personal, Social and Health Education, the librarian will discuss safe use of the internet as well as social media and the sharing of personal information via the



internet. In Geography, pupils look at global brands, mass communication through the internet and appropriate use of the internet. These points are emphasised further through Administration.

Expected Standards

Code of Conduct

We expect all pupils to:

- Show respect for each other, for teachers, other members of staff and for visitors
- Take care of your own health and safety and the safety of others
- Attend school regularly
- Be punctual for all classes
- Move quietly in and around school
- Respect the authority of your teachers
- Behave reasonably at all times, in school and on the way to and from school
- Help to keep the school clean and tidy
- Take proper care of books and equipment



We encourage all pupils to wear the school uniform that was designed by pupils and parents when the school first opened.

The school dress code for pupils is:

- Maroon blazer with school badge
- Grey v-neck jumper or cardigan
- Pale blue or white shirt
- School tie worn and tied
- Black shoes (not trainers)
- For boys grey dress trousers
- For girls grey skirt of an appropriate length; to ensure modesty, skirts should be of knee length. Grey trousers are also permissible.

We do this because wearing a uniform:

- Indicates a sense of pride in the school and helps pupils form positive attitudes to the school and to their school work
- Protects children from the harmful effects of social distinction and competitive dressing
- Promotes the school's identity in the local community
- Assists staff in the task of supervising pupils and keeping unwelcome visitors out of the school.





Pastoral Support

Each class will have a Pastoral Support Teacher. They are classroom teachers who have extra responsibility for your welfare. Your Pastoral Support Teacher will be the member of staff with whom you have the most dealings during your time here.

You may have different subject teachers during your time at St Ninian's but you will always have the same Pastoral Support teacher. This means that there is a member of staff with whom you will have regular contact and who will get to know you very well.

Pastoral Support teachers have several roles.

- Making sure you are settling into St Ninian's
- Talking with your parents and teachers about your progress
- Talking to your teachers on your behalf
- Writing reports and references
- Discussing your reports with you and your parents
- Giving you advice on the curriculum
- Helping you achieve your full potential
- Monitoring your progress
- Monitoring your attendance

How do I find my Pastoral Support Teacher?

You will meet with your Pastoral Support Teacher once a week during Personal, Social and Health Education (PSHE). At break and lunch times they can normally be found in the Forum, the Street or Cafeteria areas. They may also be in the Pastoral Support base which is at the top of the stairs, right above the Street. You should bring notes for absence or requests to be allowed out of school, for example, dental or hospital appointments, to your Pastoral Support teacher.

Study Skills and Homework

We want you to do well at school and of course you also want to do as well as you can. What we expect from you is that you will do your best in your subjects and will **be all you can be!**

Homework

You will be given homework by all subject teachers on a regular basis. This should be completed



with care and returned on time. Homework is very important as it helps encourage good study habits which will be essential through your time at St Ninian's.

Presentation is important. So you should always do your homework as well as and as neatly as you can. Pupils who regularly complete homework are more successful in their class work and exams.

If you are having problems with homework talk to your class teacher - they would far prefer you to do this than not to do the homework.

If your class teacher isn't available any teacher in the department will be happy to give you advice.

Your Planner / Homework Diary

You should use your homework diary / planner every day. Put it on the desk when you enter the class and write in the homework as it is issued. *Tick it off in the diary / planner once you have completed it*.

The school planner has been designed to help you:

- Organise your homework write down clearly what it is and when the work is due in.
- Manage the time you spend on homework check your diary every evening.
- Take responsibility for your own learning.
- Keep your parents informed about your homework.

The school planner will be issued by your Pastoral Support Teacher when you start in August. Your Pastoral Support teacher will go over the organiser and regularly

You and your parents will have the opportunity to discuss your progress with one of your teachers at Parents' Evening.


Student Peer Awards

Packed Lunches

You can bring a packed lunch with you and eat it in one of the areas provided. Alternatively you can eat it in the school cafeteria.



The Cafeteria

The cafeteria is open in the morning for breakfast. It is open for food, snacks and drinks. It is open at lunch time for hot meals, sandwiches and drinks.

The cafeteria uses a cashless system.

You will be given a PIN code and you enter this into the machine in order to put money into your account. Alternatively, your parents can put money into your account online.

Your pastoral support teacher will give you more information about this system when you start St Ninian's. If you are entitled to a free school meal then the money will be put into your account automatically each day.



The Library

All S1 pupils are warmly welcomed to the library at Saint Ninian's. There are over 7500 different books available for you to borrow – from Manga to Mandarin! You can also access one of our 15 PCs if you need to print out essays or research using the internet

In S1 you will learn how to become a confident user of the library; find out about fiction and non-fiction, explore myths about technology and the Internet, search for weird and wonderful information and take part in the Euro-reader reading scheme which has it's very own blog.


