There are various projects that you can become involved in which will allow you to work with staff, pupils and members of the local community. Please read this booklet carefully and consider, to which projects you would like to give of your time, energy and commitment?

If you are unsure about which project to volunteer for then speak with your Pastoral Support teacher or the staff member named as responsible for the project you are interested in.

Your Future Plans

Consider how the project could assist you with your academic studies or career aspirations? For example, aspiring teachers may wish to carry out placements in schools; potential nurses may want to work in a care home.

How you might use your talents for the good of younger students? For example, skilled artists might devote time to assisting in the art department; outgoing students might want to reach out to an S1 pupil as a buddy.

We try hard to match requests with the available placements and source new placements to fulfil requests as far as possible, but some may be disappointed in the first instance. In the past this has led to some pupils discovering a new area of interest—the key seems to be to throw yourself into whatever you are doing!

S6 Service Standards and Expectations

Remember you are an ambassador for St Ninian's High School. Your conduct should reflect our values and expectations at all times.

Commitment

It is of the utmost importance that you remain committed to your chosen project for its duration. People will be reliant upon you and put their trust in you and so it is important that you do not let them down.

You will volunteer for these projects and so you will be expected to show enthusiasm, maturity and dedication.

Attendance and Timekeeping

You will be provided with an attendance form which we would ask you to have signed each time you are at your placement. This will be checked regularly by your Pastoral Support Teacher. This will also enable the placement to provide feedback about your contributions.

Any absences must be reported to the member of staff in charge at least **24 hours in advance of the absence**— many local organisations rely on our help and it is vital that we give them notice and time to make any necessary changes.

Unauthorised absences can result in the loss of placement.

Be on time for your placements and projects—this is a common courtesy and also has implications for the organisations we work with.

Attire

Ensure that you are dressed appropriately — unless otherwise advised this will be in your full School Uniform.



Pupil Experience

Working with the children has helped me gain an insight into the range of support young people who have complex needs must have. It also helped me during interviews as I had experience to reflect on.

On my community placement in the care home I could see that some of the elderly people were lonely and I loved seeing how animated that would get when they would have a conversation with me.

Community Placement – Care Home for Elderly

With tutoring , I have enjoyed seeing the benefits for the pupil; it shows that I am having a positive impact on others and helping them in a beneficial way.

Individual tutor - Chemistry

Building relationships with the pupils in the lower school and being able to aid and guide them through the knowledge I have learned throughout my time at school.

Buddy

Connecting with and helping students in the lower school and having the opportunity to help them develop their reading skills. The pupil had a wider range of vocabulary now from the paired reading as he never used to read before.

Paired Reading

Over the next few pages there are descriptions of the various community placements and school based projects along with the person responsible for organising them. You should contact the teachers responsible for each project as soon as possible.

Volunteering Skills SCQF Level 3

If you take part in the S6 Service programme you will have the opportunity to gain an SCQF SQA award in Volunteering Skills. This award involves you completing a log book before, during and after your volunteering experience. The log book will be signed off by the organisation you are volunteering for throughout the volunteering process. You will then be verified by your pastoral teacher who will decide if you have enough evidence to pass the qualification.

This qualification is designed to recognise and award those who take part in volunteering. Our focus is to target those who are giving back to the school and engaging in the S6 Service programme.

Why is this award beneficial?

- Improves employability
- Improves awareness of citizenship
- Increases core skills
- Strengthens CV
- Develops personal and social skills
- Boosts self-confidence and self-esteem
- Develops team work skills
- Builds relationships
- Improves problem solving skills

How will it help you?

This award can help enhance a candidate's employability and can act as a stepping stone into future employment or a more formal stepping stone into further education. The programme will facilitate the development of different skills that will be transferable in other areas of your study as well as skills that you will be able to take on to higher education, further education and employment.

Community Placements

Contact for all Community Placements: Miss Milne, Pastoral Support Teacher

Duration: All year; all placements are weekly

Primary Placements

Visit a local primary school and assist the class teacher with a range of activities, from helping solve maths problems to sharing your musical talents. This would be a great choice for those interested in working with children or teaching.

Nursery Placements

Visit a local nursery and assist staff in a variety of ways. Previous placements have involved pupils assisting with anything from arts and crafts to story time. This would be a great choice for those interested in working with children or teaching.

Isobel Mair

Isobel Mair school provides specialist provision for pupils who have additional support needs. This would be a great choice for those interested in working with children or teaching.

Care Home – Eastwood Residential

This placement involves socialising with the residents of the home, participating in activities and assisting staff with basic tasks such as serving tea/coffee. It is a fantastic opportunity for those who enjoy spending time with others and in particular, those who wish to pursue a career as a healthcare professional.

Age Concern Dementia Centre

Situated within Eastwood Park, this centre offers day care to older people with dementia. You would assist with activities and spend time with the persons with dementia. It is a fantastic opportunity for those who enjoy spending time with others and in particular, those who wish to pursue a career as a healthcare professional.

Woodfarm Day Centre

Woodfarm Pavilion has a day centre organised by Age Concern. Your role would be to participate and assist with activities, from cards and dominoes to quizzes and board games.

Yoga Class

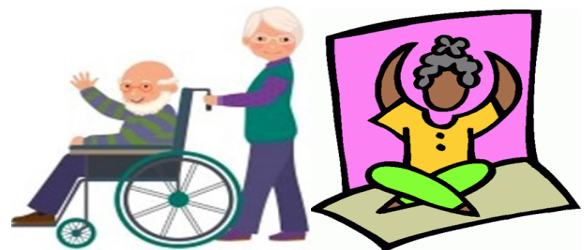

You would be expected to assist these people with a range of exercises as well as spend time socialising and distributing tea/coffee. Support for Pupils

Class Tutors

Contact: Principal Teachers of Subject Departments

Duration: All year

Description: Why not consider assisting within a department that you have enjoyed learning in throughout your time in St Ninian's. Give something back to the department and younger pupils by sharing your enthusiasm with a class and working with groups of pupils. You should approach the Principal Teacher in order to arrange a suitable time to carry out this work.

PSHE Mentor

Contact: Your Pastoral Support Teacher

Duration: All year

Description: This excellent leadership opportunity will allow you to work with a PSHE class and your pastoral support teacher every week. You will contribute to class discussions from a senior perspective, assist with group discussions and even give small presentations at key points throughout the year.

Individual Tutoring

Contact: Your Pastoral Support Teacher

Duration: As necessary

Description: Is there a subject that you have a particular flair for? Are you confident at sharing your knowledge with others? Then let your pastoral support teacher know and they will pair you up with a younger pupil who needs a little help in a specific subject area.

Buddy Programme

Contact: Your Pastoral Support Teacher; Training delivered by Miss Milne, Pastoral Support Teacher

Duration: All year

Description: Some pupils can be quite anxious about the transition from primary to secondary. Other pupils have difficulty making friends and socialising. These pupils benefit immensely from having an S6 pupil who is there to talk to them, be a friendly face and act as an excellent role model. If you think that you would enjoy this opportunity then please inform your pastoral support teacher who will pair you with a younger pupil.



Paired Reading

Contact: Principal Teacher of English (Mrs Lafferty)

Description: Sit with pupils in S1 one period a week and go through a set text with them. The pupil will read to you and you will assist with their pronunciation and understanding of the text.

Pupil Learning Centre

Contact: Mrs Merrigan

Duration: All year

Description: There is the opportunity for you to assist younger pupils in the Pupil Learning Centre. Volunteer for a period or so a week and use the skills and knowledge you have gained during your time at St Ninian's to help others.

Homework Club

Duration: All year

Description: This group takes place at lunchtime on a Tuesday in the English department and allows younger pupils to seek advice and support with their homework. If you can devote one of your lunch breaks to this group that would be very much appreciated.

Lunchtime Club

Duration: All year

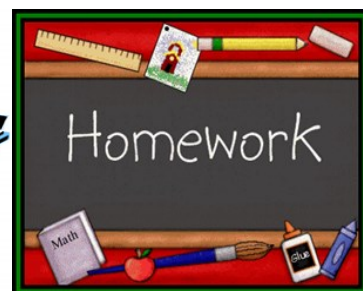

Contact: Miss Howard, Art Department

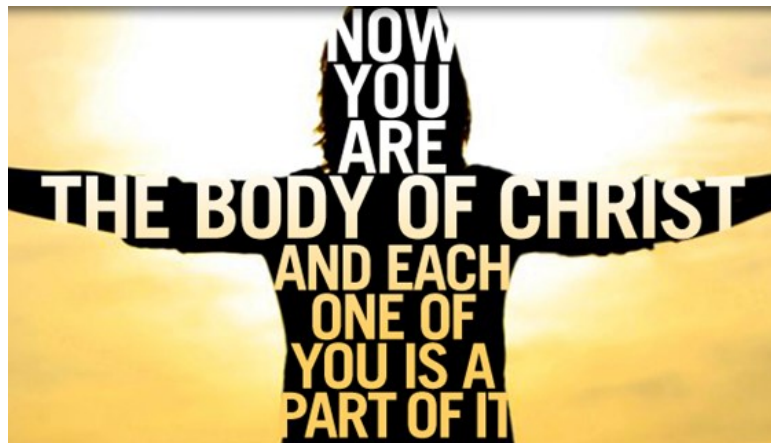
Duration: All Year
