Sometimes a chat is a useful tool!










He has been learning about how to write a sum using the symbols + and =


You have done very well Robert. Fantastic work!

<u>Continuous Provision:</u> Continuous provision refers to the resources provided in the classroom for the children to interact with creatively. It encourages active learning – so bearing this thought in mind, I thought we would have some time to do this!













Using the tap, tap art Rowan has illustrated Penguin Small's journey in the snowman's hat during a storm. George and Logan are busy with their snowman creations!

Cooper and Robert are using the penguins to play a game of skittles! Cooper made his own chart to help keep the scores for each game! Well done, boys – I think you both really enjoyed this!

There were some further chances to interact creatively with class resources later on in the week. We left messages on the whiteboard for our penguins to read!







Robert really enjoyed the tap, tap. Look at his lovely picture of the snowman and Penguin Small in the rain! George, Logan and Rowan are with the penguin skittles! George has just lined up — Logan is ready at the scoreboard and Rowan is hoping for a lucky strike!

Experiments with Ice:

I feel chilly at the thought!

Freezing occurs when a liquid is cooled and it turns into a solid and melting happens when the solid is heated and turns into a liquid. After hearing all about Penguin Small we wanted to conduct a few experiments using ice cubes!

Let's try melting an ice cube in our hands for twenty seconds at a time. There were some interesting results!







- Cooper and George's ice cube melted after 3 minutes 40 secs.
- Zoe and Rowan's ice cube completely melted after 2minutes and 20 secs.
- Elsie, Brooke and Darcey's ice cube melted after 3 minutes.
- Robert and Logan's ice cube melted after 4 minutes and 20 secs.

We wondered why this could be..... here are the children's ideas....

- Our hands could be different temperatures
- The ice cubes could have been different sizes/ thicknesses
- We could be applying different pressures on the cubes.
- Some ice cubes might have come out of the freezer sooner than others.

We also had several other experiments on the go at the same time!

Three identical pots, three ice cubes in each pot, three different locations.... Classroom, outdoors, fridge. Which melts first and why?

In fact, the outdoor cubes melted first, classroom in second place and the fridge last. We thought this had a bit to do with air and circulation. This was quite a tricky problem!



How do we stop ice from melting? Cooper's idea was to place the cube in really cold water, which we did. We also put foil around our cube....

Results: Ice cold water - 35 minutes to melt.

Foil – one hour.

Foil is a good insulator – a bit like a flask, according to Zoe....it keeps things warm or cool!

How about a bit of fun at the end of the day? We had a tray, some penguins and some shaving cream! Make a snowy landscape for the penguins to stay.....













Book Sharing:


We all love a book in P1-3. George brought in one of his favourite books to share and managed to get this in before 9.00am!

Brooke brought it to school and wanted me to have it! Thank you very much for thinking of me Brooke!










PE:
