a b c d e (as in egg) f g h ( used to change the sound of other letters - not actually used to start words apart from ham, hamster & helicopter) i (as in ee) l m n o p s r t u (pronounced - oo)

si / se = sh

ch as in loch

dh / fh / gh ... guttural / soft sound , whereas  $\frac{dh/gh}{dt}$  are silent when they come in the middle or end of a word

th / sh / - silent if followed by a consonant e.g shnàmh or shrac but

if the TH/SH is followed by a vowel then only the first letter is silent e.g

thuit sheinn but 'thu' is an exception, there maybe others.

de = i

g - sometimes has more of a k sound

bh = v

ph = f

vowels have a longer sound - à è ì ò ù as well as the short sound a e i o u (and words can have completely different meanings with same spelling but for the accent. To type, press ctrl & `key together followed by the particular letter or codes...)
