Notes From the Head Teacher

Welcome to our June Newsletter, which highlights the work of the term in the secondary department and also brings session 2018-19 to a close.

As you will see from this brief newsletter the secondary department have been busy on a number of fronts, encouraging our young people to be enterprising, engaging in cultural, sporting and citizenship activities, which enable our pupils to develop skills for learning, life and work.

We have had a number of interesting and engaging events and speakers at the school this term, which we believe will have influenced our young people as they consider their own learning journeys in school and beyond. We were particularly pleased to welcome a group from Papua, Indonesia to SES during their time on Harris and we also welcomed Mr Alasdair Allan, MSP to the school whose presentation to the pupils was linked to the UNCR of Children's Rights. We also welcomed Mr Bernard Chisholm, Director of Education to Sir E Scott School during his end of session visits across the local authority

Learning & teaching

For our senior pupils and staff, this term saw the culmination of the year 's work as our young people sat their SQA exams. The majority of pupils made very good use of Study leave opting to come in to school for further tuition by teachers or preferring to study at home than in school. Now of course it is a waiting game and we hope that the results on Tuesday 6th of August will live up to expectations, particularly for our young people who have received conditional offers from various colleges and universities.

Thank you to the partners who have helped deliver courses and supported work placements for our pupils this session again –Mairi MacIver, CLD for assisting with the ASDAN course, the Scaladale Centre for their ongoing support with outdoor learning courses, local employers and businesses for supporting our S3 work placement week and other ongoing work placements for senior pupils throughout the session, Skills Development Scotland for their ongoing support at school events and on a regular basis with individual pupils and group work.

S1 pupils had the opportunity to experience relevant outdoor learning activities through the John Muir Award, which fits in so well to our school's setting and environment. S1 pupil progress reports were issued to parents, which we hope provided a clear overview of the pupils' strengths across all curricular areas and their next steps for improvement. Thank you to the parents who took the time to give some feedback, which was much appreciated.

A successful 3-day induction for P7s from SES and LMS, moving into S1 in August 2019, took place in May. Prior to that, P7 pupils from SES and LMS experienced well-planned weekly curricular transition opportunities, engaging successfully in a block of work in Science with Mr McCririck, in HE with Mrs Laing and the P7 GME pupils worked with S1 GM pupils and Miss MacLennan in doing preparatory work in Gàidhlig and Eachdraidh.

Mr Mulhern, English Department delivered YPI (Youth & Philanthropy Initiative) to S3 pupils, linking it to the English experiences and outcomes. This learning and teaching focus resulted in a very exciting and impressive 2019 YPI Final event on Friday 10th May. All 4 S3 groups made a particularly strong representation as to why the charity of their choice should receive the YPI cheque for £3000. It was clear from the presentations that the four groups had researched their charity very well and had put a lot of work into their fundraising efforts and their final presentations. They came across in a very mature and confident manner, which provided the judges with an incredibly hard task in choosing the winning group. The four charities chosen by pupils this year were: The Samaritans, Marie Curie, Western Isles Pregnancy Crises Support and the Hebridean Men's Cancer Support Group. The winning team consisted of

S2 have been participating in 'Decider Skills 'Workshops, led by Mike Sullivan, CAMHS and assisted by Mr Johnson and Mrs Rogers. **Decider Skills are CBT MENTAL HEALTH SKILLS THAT ARE EFFECTIVE, FUN, MEMORABLE AND EASY TO USE.** One of the aims of the programme is to provide children, young people and adults with the skills to recognise their own thoughts, feelings and behaviours, and to monitor and manage their own emotions and mental health.

Across the secondary department pupils have experienced excellent opportunities to learn more about the world of work, the skills required for various careers and heard about various career pathways people have taken during our Developing the Young workforce events, culminating in the excellent RAF Youth event held at the school this term. I am indebted to the DYW working group, led by Mrs Laing and to Air Vice Marshall Ross Paterson who put much work and effort into taking this partnership forward and look forward to seeing further opportunities of engagement in the session ahead.

Celebrating Pupil Successes

We continue to be very proud of our young people's achievements and successes, within and out with the school setting. There has been a particularly strong emphasis on sporting achievements this term across our S1-4 year groups, with an article from Mr Johnson, PE Department on the recent WIIGA Sports Day and Youth Event; an update on Rachael Johnstone and Anish Toor achievements as they continue to do well in their chosen sport.

It is good to hear of other young people like Natalie Maclean successfully represented TNI netball team at a recent event in Inverness and continuing to do well at Highland dancing competitions, as does Emma Peterson and Abbie Lightbody; Jessica MacLeod, S5 school leaver was selected to play for TNI senior girls, and WIIGA team, at the island games; Connor MacDonald is showing a real talent in Darts and Cameron Mackay is developing an interest and skills in cycling also attending mainland events. Bha tòrr diofar rudan a' tachairt air an latha: anns a' mhadainn, bha co-nbrachadh leis na sgoileirean air fad; an uairsin bha bùth-obrach ann airson ionnsramaidean mar na pioban agus drumaichean; bha cuideachd Coding UHI ann agus obraichean le UHI Stem. Bha bùth-obrach ann airson òran a sgrìobhadh còmhla ri Bethzienna Williams mar phàirt den charthannas 'Never Such Innocence'. Nuair a bha an co-nbrachadh a' tachairt, dh'fheumadh sgoilearan a dhol ann am buidheannan agus seòrsa de bhara-cuibhle a thogail le direach an stuth a bh' aca ann am baga.

Aig uair feasgar, nuair a bha àm dìnnear ann, thainig pleana 'Typhoon' seachad air an sgoil gu math iosal. Fhuair a h-uile duine a-mach airson am plèana fhaicinn ach bha e seachad uabhasach luath!

BLESMA (Military Charity for Limbless Veterans) talk

PC Rick Henderson arranged for two speakers from the Making Generation R project to visit SES at the end of April.

Jason Dobbs spoke to the S5 & 6 pupils, while Mick McConnell spoke to S3-6. *Jason* Dobbs served for 11 years in the Royal Marines joining straight from school. During Jason's active career his deteriorating mental health went unnoticed resulting in a near fatal suicide attempt. Discharged from service, Jason spent several years experiencing homelessness and drug, alcohol addiction becoming invisible to society until found by his friend. Jason now lives in Aberdeenshire with his family and travels the world helping the company he works for enhance the performance of the world's energy industry. He started sharing his story with Making Generation R this year and looks forward to making an impact through inspiration with young people in the years to come.

Mick McConnell served as part of the Royal Air Force Police as a dog handler. Whilst on patrol in Afghanistan searching for IED's his dog Memphis momentarily left his side and Mick stepped on a mine, causing life changing injury, eventually resulting in leg amputation. Through a lengthy and continued recovery, Mick has worked closely with the Royal Benevolent fund, sharing his story at the Hammersmith Apollo broadcast to cinemas across the UK. His dog Memphis became the winner of the 2015 Soldiering On Award, and he has been sharing his story with Making Generation R since 2017, talking to students across the country.

Papua-Scotland Study Tour 2019 – Lewis & Harris

Professor Alastair Macintosh, The Centre for Human Ecology, The Pearce Institute, Govan, Glasgow visited the school at the end of April with a group of delegates from Papua, Indonesia who were on a study tour of the island to experience a range and depth of community land trusts. The delegates met with P7 and S1-3 pupils, which provided a rich cultural/global citizenship experience for our pupils.

The P3/4 GME pupils welcomed the group with a Gaelic song, which was reciprocated with a song from Papua, and then some of the delegates shared a little about why they had come to Harris speaking in Indonesian. Pupils then had the opportunity to ask questions with an interpreter on hand to assist. The group were very impressed with the school building, the pupils and the fact that we are teaching through the medium of Gaelic.



S3 Enterprise Day

On the 22nd of May 2019, our year group took part in an Enterprise Day which was facilitated by the North Harris Trust and our PA teacher Mrs B Mackay. We visited multiple different businesses across the Isle of Harris, including the Isle of Harris Distillery, the Essence of Harris Factory and many more. The Distillery was the first stop on the trip, where Shona Macleod (manager of the Distillery) showed us around some of the different rooms in the building, including the Flavour Room, the Still Hall and the canteen, and she explained a bit about the many different jobs there are within the Distillery.

Next stop was the new Loom Shed brewery, with Jamie McGowan and his partner Callum Bennett. He talked to us about what went into both starting and running a business. Callum then showed us the basics of brewing beer. Then a quick trip down the road to the Essence of Harris factory. Deenie McGowan then told us a bit about the business and how they run day to day. We were introduced to some of the ladies who help make and sell the candles and we also discussed our favourite scents by Essence of Harris.

Finally, after a quick stop-off at school for a break, we set off to Bunavoneadar to check out the hydro scheme. David Wake (an employee of the North Harris Trust) told us some information about it and how much money it brings in for the trust usually which was very interesting. To finish the day, we set off to Huisinish for lunch and to complete an activity to do with business within Harris. This was facilitated by Michael Hunter and Gordon Cumming from the North Harris Trust. The activity consisted of creating a business plan in small groups that would benefit the local area. Some interesting ideas were put forward, such as a mobile beach bar, a sheep shop to buy all your woolly goods and a hotel for dogs. The day was both interesting and informative, and we all thoroughly enjoyed ourselves.



Western Isles Island Games

Mountain Biking

Recently, Anish Toor, S4 was competing in the second round of the HSBC British Downhill series in Fort William. He is competing at Scottish National level against the best of his age across Scotland. 2 races this year, including the last one at Fort William are UK competitions against the best in the UK. His race was on exactly the same track as the world's best Elite athletes compete on at the World Cup in two weeks, and the UK'S best Elite riders were competing that day with him.

As the race commentator said on the day... 'anyone that can complete that course in under 10 minutes is a very good rider'. Anish did it in 6 mins, with only 1 timed race run due to the number of long red flag stoppages for serious injuries.

"I made a few silly mistakes on my race run which cost a lot of time but I was happy enough to come away with 38th out of 52. I knocked over a minute of my time from last year as well which is really good" Anish

Anish is incredibly dedicated to his sport and demonstrates huge ambition, dedication and resilience in pursuing his passion for Downhill Mountain Biking. As Anish does not have access to a proper downhill track to train on, he's doing amazingly well, given his circumstances.

Throughout this process we have been exploring philanthropy and charity and considering the positive impact this can have on our community.

Last December Kate Langley, development worker with the Volunteer Centre for the Western Isles, and Mr Mulhern, English teacher, explained the principles of the project to S3 and outlined the activities involved, the skills developed and the goals aimed for.

The Youth Philanthropy Initiative invites pupils to:

- Research the needs of their local community
- Identify a local charity which they believe makes the most difference
- Find out about the charity's work, its budget, history and strategies
- Build a relationship with the charity
- Develop skills in public speaking through a presentation
- Convince others that their charity is worth supporting

Students have been working in teams to consider the needs of our community and identify a local charity we believe is best placed to make a positive change. We divided ourselves into four groups in order to investigate the charities of our choice. These turned out to be:

- Hebridean Men's Cancer Support Group
- Marie Curie
- The Samaritans
- Western Isles Pregnancy Crises Support

Pupils have been in contact with those running their chosen charities. In some cases, we have visited them at their place of work while others have invited charity managers to the school to discuss their charities with them. Through this project we have been learning how to assess our chosen charity's management, strategy, staffing arrangements and services.

During this process we have had the chance to develop skills in research, analysis, presentation, and communication which all contribute to a student's growth and confidence. In these ways we have had opportunities to develop a real understanding of some of the challenges facing the community. It is hoped young people will be inspired to work to change society for the better.

Students use their research to make presentations on the reasons that their chosen charity is most deserving of support. The team judged to have made the most compelling presentation is given a £3000 YPI Grant to present to their charity.

As a school we had to raise £250 as a contribution to the £3000 which would be awarded to the charity represented by the winning group.

In addition to this contribution, each of the groups also chose to independently organise a fundraiser event to raise money for their chosen charity above and beyond any money awarded through the YPI event.

The Samaritans were the first group to have their fundraiser, holding a pancake and lemonade sale at the school during a morning interval in March. They managed to raise an impressive £130 for their charity.

The next group to hold their event was the Western Isles Pregnancy Crisis Support group. They held a Swishing event in The Harris Hotel with kind donations of baking and clothes. They raised over £400 in just 4 hours!

The Marie Curie group held their fundraiser, a café from 1:00 – 3:30. Again, the Harris Hotel very kindly provided the venue. That group raised a grand total of £650 -- the most raised out of all the groups!

The final group to hold their fundraiser was the Hebridean Men’s Cancer Support Group, made up of just two pupils. They had a Beach Fun Day at the end of April at Horgabost beach with everyone welcome. The pair raised a total of £180.81 which is amazing work for just the two of them.

Each of the YPI groups did extremely well and showed skills of organisation and responsibility, as well as making their charities very proud.

The final judging event took place on the 10th of May when each of the four YPI groups had to give a presentation on what their chosen charity does, how they came to choose their charity and why they think their charity deserves the money. These presentations could include videos, poems, a short play or songs if they wished. The final was held in the school performance area where all secondary pupils, teachers, parents and people from the charity could come to watch. There were four judges who volunteered to observe the group’s presentations: of SES; Michael Hunter, ranger with the North Harris Trust; Hannah Macleod, a former pupil; Paul Munro, the chairman of Harris Voluntary Services; and Bellanne O’Brien, a development worker with the Volunteer Service Western Isles. Each of the groups presented the case for their charity very well with all presentations including a video or videos along with their accompanying powerpoints. After the presentations, pupils, parents, guests and teachers went to the staff room for teas, coffees and baking, organised by the S3 pupils for their guests, while the judges were making their final decision.

A short while after, everyone made their way down to the performance area including all the S1s and S2s for the announcement of the winning group. Hannah Macleod announced the Western Isles Pregnancy Crisis Support the winning YPI Group of 2019! The winning group were presented with a £3000 check for their charity and were invited to Perth in June for the YPI Scotland National Event 2019.

We’d like to thank everyone in the school, parents, the wider community and the charities themselves who contributed in all kinds of ways to the project and the presentation event.

Overall, the YPI has been a very successful project for the groups, charities and the school. As a pupil who took part in the YPI project, I can say the YPI project has been a very valuable and very enjoyable experience. It has involved hard work but has allowed us to take responsibility for our own learning, to show initiative, to develop leadership qualities, to increase self-confidence and has given us the opportunity to develop our speaking and presentation skills in a real context. All of these experiences and the skills we have developed through them will be very helpful for us all in the future – in the senior phase of our school careers and beyond.
