Learners exercise choice, including the appropriate use of digital technology, and take increasing responsibility as they become more independent in their learning. They understand the purpose of their learning and have opportunities to lead the learning.

Our learners are successful, confident and responsible. They contribute effectively to the life of the school and wider community in a range of well-planned activities. They know that their views are sought, valued and acted upon.



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Features of highly-effective practice:

Learners play an active role in the school and wider community and regularly take on leadership roles, including leading learning.

Learners receive high-quality feedback and have an accurate understanding of their progress in learning and what they need to do to improve.

Learners are able to give effective feedback to peers on their learning and suggest ways in which they can improve.

Challenge Questions:

How well are we enabling learners to become independent learners and develop the four capacities?

How effectively do we involve learners and parents in planning and evaluating learning?

How well do we enable all children and young people to engage in self- and peer-assessment to improve their learning? How do we know this benefits learning?

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The Teacher and Student's Roles

Models of Participation

2 Consulted and informed

The project is designed and run by adults, but children are consulted.

They have a full understanding of the process and their opinions are taken seriously.

4 Child-initiated, shared decisions with adults

Children have the ideas, set up projects and come to adults for advice, discussion and support. The adults do not direct, but offer their expertise for young people to consider.

1 Assigned but informed

Adults decide on the project and children volunteer for it. The children understand the project, they know who decided to involve them and why. Adults respect young people's views.

Degrees of Participation

3 Adult-initiated, shared decisions with children

Adults have the initial idea, but young people are involved in every step of the planning and implementation. Not only are their views considered, but also children are also involved in taking the decisions.

5 Child-initiated and directed

Young people have the initial idea and decide how the project is to be carried out. Adults are available but do not take charge.

What Makes a Good Teacher

A "Good Teacher"... (Dylan Wiliam)

- Establishes and informs students where they are in their learning
- Identifies and agrees the learning destination
- Carefully plans a route with pupils through learner conversations
- Begins the learning journey
- Regularly shares with pupils their progress and next steps through
- Makes adjustments to the learning and teaching as needed




